Editor's Column

By Connie A TALE OF TWO SCHOOL DISTRICTS

By approval of the 18-man committee which last year put Weidman School District under the control of the Mecosta-Osceola Intermediate District, the Beal City School District was allowed to remain a single unit.

We asked how this could be, when the Weidman people are told we must consolidate with the huge Mecosta-County area "or else".

The answer:

"Why, the Beal City School Board went down to Lansing and made such a holler that the bigshots let them stay independent."

We quote from a modest mimeographed sheet the Beal City Board sent out last year:

"The people of Beal City are proud of their school and are willing to finance it."

(For the past 10 years the Weidman School Board, the Weidman School administration and staff have down-graded the Weidman School, telling students and parents the Weidman School is not good enough.)

"Beal City is definitely a grow-ing district.... we will be considerably larger in the near future."

(Weidman also is definitely a growing district, and also will be considerably larger in the near future. The answer, however, is that the Weidman District will not be allowed to wait. We will be compelled to liquidate the Weidman District and join the Big-Big School plan right now.)

"Class sizes are much smaller (in Beal City) than most schools in the county, thus allowing for more individual help to the students.'

(Weidman people are told their classes are too small, we must have Big-Big classes to be acceptable.)

"We (Beal City) believe that the students of a smaller school have a greater chance for leadership than they would have in a large system."

(Weidman people are told that students must have Big-Big school numbers in order to create leadership.)

"Graduates of Beal City High School have always done well in their college work. Business and professional men prefer girls from the Beal City Commercial department to fill vacancies they have in their offices."



By approval of the 18-man committee which last year put Weidman School District under the control of the Mecosta-Osceola Intermediate District, the Beal City School District was allowed to remain a single unit.

We asked how this could be, when the Weidman people are told we must consolidate with the huge Mecosta-County area "or else".

The answer:

"Why, the Beal City School Board went down to Lansing and made such a holler that the bigshots let them stay independent."

We quote from a modest mimeographed sheet the Beal City Board sent out last year:

"The people of Beal City are proud of their school and are willing to finance it."

(For the past 10 years the Weidman School Board, the Weidman School administration and staff have down-graded the Weidman School, telling students and par-ents the Weidman School is not good enough.)

"Beal City is definitely a grow-ing district....we will be considerably larger in the near future."

(Weidman also is definitely a growing district, and also will be considerably larger in the near future. The answer, however, is that the Weidman District will not be allowed to wait. We will be compelled to liquidate the Weidman District and join the Big-Big School plan right now.) "Class sizes are much smaller (in Beal City) than most schools in

the county, thus allowing for more individual help to the students." (Weidman people are told their classes are too small, we must

have Big-Big classes to be accept able.)

"We (Beal City) believe that the students of a smaller school have a greater chance for leadership than they would have in a large system.

(Weidman people are told that students must have Big-Big school numbers in order to create leadership.) "Graduates of Beal City High

School have always done well in their college work. Business and professional men prefer girls from the Beal City Commercial de-partment to fill vacancies they have in their offices."
