WEIDMAN FIREMEN CONSIDER GETTING RESUSCITATOR

At the first 1967 meeting of the Weidman Fire Department, a discussion was in order on the need for a resuscitator, the life-giving artificial-respiration machine, in the Weidman area.

The meeting was held last week Tuesday evening at 7.30, with 15 Volunteer Firemen present. Fire Chief Ed Fox called the meeting to order, and new projects were discussed.

The majority of the Firemen felt that, on drilling a well for water supply at the Fire Barn, there should be a direct pump from the well. This was tabled, and at the next meeting more information from well drillers will be available for the Firemen to decide on.

Discussion on changing the outside fire pushbutton to the inside of the building resulted in a decision to have one outside and one inside.

A debate on the necessity of the Fire Department's having on hand, with properly trained Firemen, an artificial respiration machine, a resuscitator, resulted in the appointment of Ted Smith to look into the project and report at the next regular meeting. The need for a vacuum pump

was discussed, for use on the auxiliary truck. Ralph McCreight was named to look into the price of one to take care of the work

it has to do for us.

Also discussed was the White Elephant Sale to be held March 11 at the Village Inn tavern in Weidman, with all benefits to go to the Firemen's fund. All articles for donation for the sale may be left at the Weidman Fire Hall or the Village Inn tavern, or contact Walt Smith, Ray Smith or Dan Wernette for pickup of articles.

Fire Chief Ed Fox explained to the Firemen how house numbers are numbered in Sherman, and Nottawa Townships.

The meeting was adjourned, and some cards were played. The next regular meeting of the Weidman Fire Department will be the second Tuesday in February.

ANOTHER BLIZZARD CLOSES MOST AREA SCHOOLS

Central Michigan is having a rough winter, and our latest blizzard, roaring in Monday, closed most area schools for Tuesday and probably Wednesday.

The Weidman School was no exception, and administration officials said there was little probability of the school's being open Wednesday.

Tuesday marked the fifth day the Weidman School had been closed due to severe weather conditions this winter. The lost time will not be made up come spring, the administration said. In other areas, snow and cold hold back lake development in

this area somewhat, although the Gatehouse crews have been working steadily all winter op clearing for Isabella Lake. On Lake of the Hills, a drag-line has been working on the Smith and Drallette sections of the project.

HISTORY OF SHERMAN TWP By Fred L. Kent

(Editor's Note: Again this week we are happy to present Fred L. Kent's History of Sherman Township, from his priceless writings of 1914. The narrative takes up from our last instalment:

The first township meeting was held at the residence of Cyrus Dunbar in the spring of 1869. Wesley Ellis, who with his brother, Frank were temporary residents of the town, was elected Supervisor; Daniel Flinn, clerk; and John Souls, treasurer. In the spring of 1870 there were 12 votes cast. John T. Cahoon was elected supervisor. When the writer came here in January, 1870, there was not a town road, and the state road had only been completed as far as Curtis Camps, now Woodin's Mills or Drew. In those days there were three commissioners elected.

John Kent was one of the three in 1870 but I am not sure who the others were. They opened the road south of the Gibbs Bridge, nearly one and one-half miles to the "Ward Tote Road," and west to Dunbar's and Burgess' on the county line two and one-half miles during that year.

In 1870 the population of the county was 4, 113, and of Sher-

man Township, 134. In the fall of 1869, E.K.Woods, Giles Gilbert and Amos Johnson built a log store on the Sherman side of the town line at Sherman City.

Later, Mr. Johnson became sole owner and built a two story building on the present site of L. C. Mendel's store, which, on

Sept. 19, 1878, was blown to pieces by the cyclone which also carried away the school house and other buildings, doing \$10, -000 worth of damage.

The first school house built in the town was in Dist. No. 1, Sherman, at Sherman City.

It was a log building with shake roof and cost the district \$225. Wm.K.Gibbs was the contractor. The first term of school was taught by Samuel Gettings, in the the fall of 1870. School officers; director, John T. Cahoon; asses-sor, A.F. Swem; moderator, David R. Haves.

The scholars who attended the first term of school were Fred Cahoon, Charles Cahoon, Henry Swem, Lizzie Hayes, Celestia Hayes, Calvin Hayes, Royal Gibbs, Ansel Gibbs, Albert Gibbs, Adelbert Butterfield, and Parry Butterfield.

Lizzie Hayes, now Mrs. O.E. Kent of Weidman, is the only one left in the county who attended the first school, 44 years ago (this was written in 1914. -- Ed.). The first school house built in Dist. No. 2 was completed in 1871. John Kent was the builder and received \$80 for his labor.

The first school officers were: director, Wm. Connor; moderator, Alexander Miller; assessor, Cyrus Dunbar; (Connor having moved away, James H. Tinker was director in the fall of '71.)

The first term was taught by Miss Anna Ingerson of Allegan County in the winter of '71-72. (She is now Mrs. Ansel Gibbs of Barryton.)

The first scholars were Christoher Dunbar, Thomas Dunbar, Ettie Tinker, Alice Tinker, Amos Tinker, Ellen Tinker, En-dora Tinker, Wm. Miller and Fred Kent. The first term of school in Dist. No. 3 was taught in a small board house on the James J. Bennett farm, Sec. 36. A board school house built on the northwest corner of the Bennett farm, which cost \$300, was later used until the present house was built on the southwest corner of Sec. 25. I am unable to say who the first teacher was or the names of the scholars, as none of the inhabitants of the district at that time is left in the township to tell the story.

In Dist. No. 4, the first term of school was taught by Miss Ad-die Woodin. The scholars in attendance were Jennie Burd, Luella Woodin, James, Hiram and George Smith. A log shanty which stood on the farm now owned by Mrs. John Hine was used as the first school house.

School Dist. No. 5 was organized in 1879. Wm. J. Darnell and H.M.Goodenough built the first school house, for which they received \$50.

The first school officers were: Director, W.J.Darnell; Assessor, H.M.Goodenough; Moderator, Winfield Bly.

The first teacher was Miss Maggie Ruxton. The scholars were Marion F. Martin, Lyman and Sammie Goodenough, William, James, Elijah and Alvira Darnell and Charles Sutherland. Dist. No. is my very busiest time. Maybe 5 was divided between Dists. No. 2 and 4 several years ago.

The first term of school in Dist. No. 6 was taught by Miss Sadie McCombs, in an old log house built by Walter Lyon on the farm of Jesse Thompson, in 1881. Richard Alderman was Director, Thompson Assessor, and Mr. Dimond Moderator.

A log school house was built on

the farm, at this date, 1914, oc-cupied by R.D.Ellsworth. A few years later the present Darnell School house was built on Sec. 10.

The first scholars to attend school in this district were Edward and Frankie Alderman, Eva, William, Ida, Lillie and Edith Thompson, and John and Dell Rodgers.

The resident ministers of early times were A.F.Swem, Alexander Miller, and later, Elder Burret. Sunday School Organizer Densmore of Greenville organized the first Sunday School, in Dist. No. 2, in the early '70's. The earliest inhabitants of the township now living here (1914) are:

Mrs. Margaret Darnell, Bailey Darnell, Sr., Mrs. Lizzie Good-enough, wife of Elaner Goodenough, who came in 1868; Oscar E. Kent, who came in the fall of 1869; Dell and Fred Kent, and Mrs. Ida M. Shook, wife of John Shook, who came in January of 1870; Mrs.O.E.Kent and Mrs. Millard Pennington, who came in the winter of 1870.

James H. Tinker and John B. Tinker came in 1871. The former was treasurer and supervisor for many years; the latter, clerk and justice. Both died many years ago.

This was a combined business and vacation trip, and several days were spent in Florida, where Rev. Spires has relatives.

Mr. and Mrs. John Warner accompanied them as far as Florida driving their pickup and hauling a trailer of supplies for the mission station, including several barrels of clothing and 130 tambourines.

Mr. and Mrs. Warner saw the others off at the Miami International Airport Saturday morning at 9 o'clock, and then started back for Michigan.

This was the first airplane flight for four of the party, and was an exciting part of the trip. After the initial nervousness, they all enjoyed the flight and none was sick. They purposely scheduled their return flight for night, and all spoke of the beauty of seeing the lights of Miami.

The General Assembly started Sunday, Jan. 1, and lasted through Sunday, Jan. 8. It was held at Mt. Shiloh Mission Station, about 100 miles from Kingston. It resembled any church conference or camp meeting, with vari-

ous services scheduled throughout the day. The large tabernacle seated 1,000, and was overflowing throughout the assembly.

This impressed our group because most of the people came by G.C.Y., 6 p.m. boat, and some as far as 100 miles Bible Study, Wednesday evenaway.

Very few Jamaicans own cars, and even a bicycle is a luxury. Shoes are so costly that they are carried on the head while the trav Pat Pollington, Mrs.Betty Purvis, eler walks the rugged terrain bare Mr.and Mrs.Bernard Pitts, Mr. foot, and the shoes then worn for dress at the services.

There was rejoicing over a new car purchased and presented to the mission station. Our congregation, along with one from Pontiac and one from Ohio, raised enough for the down payment, and have enough pledges to pay the remainder in two years.

All six stayed at the mission house and ate as the natives do while there. They enjoyed most of the food, although they commented that it was different and richer than ours. The natives live almost entirely off the land. eating the fruits and other tropical plants that are in abundance. They make much use of the

banana. It is made into a breakfast cereal, and served boiled, as a main dish.

The natives butchered a goat to give their visitors fresh meat, and they found it very eatable, but enjoyed most the good old American chicken the few times it was served.

Their drinking water was boiled rain water, which was no problem to obtain because it rained at least once a day.

At the close of the assembly the party took two days for sightseeing on the island. They visited Kingston, the capital city of Jamaica, and also the largest and most modern. It was there they saw a group of the notori-ous Restifarians. These are men of violence, who hate the white man, and are recognized by their practice of gathering cut hair from the barber shops and matting this with their own, with the help of used motor oil. They congregate in settlements and are under police surveillance be cause of their brutality. They object to having their pictures taken, but our group was able to snap one and are hoping it will be good.

They also visited the famous resort town of Montego Bay, and took the beautiful Caribbean Shore drive through the mountains. Mrs. Spires, Anna, and Lynn Ann all took a dip in the Caribbean.

All in all, it was a wonderful trip, and a great experience for these young people. They came home, not only with memories of the beautiful sights they saw, but more thankful than ever to have been born in this great United States of ours.

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In the Editor's Mail To the Editor:

As a member of the 18 Man Board, appointed to study the organizational problems of the school districts of Isabella County, I have been asked to present my views concerning the question to be voted on at the election Feb. 11th.

It was the opinion of the majority of this Board, that if a school district offers an adequate educational program, based on todays' concept of what this program should cover, it should have sufficient area, valuation and membership, to make this possible.

A study of the problems of the Weidman Community School district showed a definite lack of these basic requirements. Also the recent withdrawal of large areas of property from the district has created a district pattern which is both inefficient and costly to operate.

It was never the responsibility or desire of this Board to liquidate any school district or force them to be absorbed by any BIG Organization where they would lose their identity and local interest in school problems. But this Board felt the best interests of this district were to become an active and important unit in the consolidation of the present Remus-Mecosta, Barryton and Weidman districts. This combined district would provide the necessary requirements for area, valuation, and membership, to support an educational program comparable to any in the state. There is no question that the cost of education is high, and that some other form of taxation based on a larger segment of society is necessary. I also believe we will have to be organizaed as efficient districts before we will qualify for these funds.

Before we decide how we will vote in this election, let us remember that school districts are organized and school buildings built, not as a momument to the pride and ego of a local community or individual, but they are built for one basic purpose, to provide an equal opportunity for every child to develop his imagination, ability and ambition for a profitable and useful life.
