

(Editor's Note: This is an article from the Flint Daily Journal dated March 8, 1964. John Gunckel of Flint has saved the piece, a general resume of the origin of the State of Michigan and some of its unbelievable native wealth.

(We hereby print a part of the article, pertaining to game kills in the 1800s.)
In a paper entitled "Slaughter

of the Innocents," H.B. Raney, East Saginaw, outlined the first

Originally there were five geese, then there were four. Whether the fifth was an odd one and just left, or whether it fell to a hunter's bullet, we don't know. Anyhow, spectators all around the lake watched the big birds in fascination as they appeared on all sections of the lake, eating weed seeds and frogs. We put out a peck of wild-bird seed for them, but they preferred their own foraging, mainly for weed seeds. And yes, this was as close as we could get to the geese after the first few days on the lake.

crisis encountered by Michigan's deer herd. He said market hunters took 21,000 deer in 1878. By 1880, the kill had increased to 70,000. In that year 9,000 saddles (both hindquarters) weighing about 1,130,000 pounds, were shipped to markets.

Raney calculated that, in 1881 12,000 deer were killed for lumber-camp tables, 10,000 were taken for hides, and 5,000 were killed for "home consumption."

That was in the Lower Peninsula. It was estimated that about 12,000 deer were killed for all purposes in the Upper Peninsula.

life and the subsequent reduction in numbers is evident from other



Frank recalls that he once helped John Otterbine in his barber shop here, but Frank sickened, he says, of shaving lumberjacks with tobacco juice running down their chins into the lather.

Frank and Bertha Gross lived on their farm at Weidman's southwest edge, and raised their fine family there. Frank started work at the pickle factory here, worked 17 years on salary, with Allen Wolfe as a colleague for 17 years, during which Allen be-came manager; George Raub was manager succeeding Allen, and Frank became manager in 1940. He retired at age 69

Isabella County's November Draft Quota Jumps to 20

LANSING - Isabella County's November draft call will shoot up to 20 from this month's quota of one, according to the state Selective Service System.

The total November call for the state, however, is only moderately above October's total, The call next month will be 1,578, compared to this month's 1,289.

Mrs. Ruth Johnson, clerk of the Isabella County draft board, said today the fluctuations in quotas from month to month are caused by the changing number of eligible men. Enlistments, deferments and larger and smaller groups in age categories cause

each county's manpower pool to change. Draft quotas are based on the number of available men, said Mrs. Johnson.

The high and low monthly quotas generally balance out over a year's time, she said.

Clare County's draft quota went from three in October to four in November, according to the state Selective Service System. Gratiot's jumped from none to 12, while Mecosta's went from none to two. Midland's rose from one in October to 16 in Novem-

Largest single draft call for the state next month will be Wayne County, where 424 men have been ordered to duty.
