At a meeting of the Board of Education of the Chippewa Hills School District Oct. 10, all the Board members were present ex-cept John Berryhill. School administrators were present, includ-ing Supt. James Jorgensen, Asst. Supts. Ralph Turnbull and Chas. Pelham, and Principal Lewis Chalker Chalker.

September bills, including pay roll acount, for a grand total of \$98,026.12 were approved for payment. Central Michigan Bank at Barryton was approved as depository for bond issue funds. A report was heard by Asst. Supt Pelham on high school comple-tion programs and adult educa-tion, listing 57 adults in high school completion and 24 in enrichment programs.

The Board changed Lewis Chalker's status on government programs. He was changed to a full time federal aid co-ordinator and relieved of duties as building principal at Mecosta. The Board approved acceptance of the Sec. 4 program as written, and order-ed implementation of the program as soon as possible.

Section 4 is part of the State Aid Act. It means a \$50,000 grant to this school. It is concerned with underprivileged children. ---0----
