FARMERS, SPORTSMEN UP IN ARMS OVER DOE-KILL SCHEDULE HERE

Land owners and sportsmen in the Weidman area are up in arms over an edict from the Michigan Conservation Department allotting 680 doe-killing permits for a very small piece, "area 39," comprising less than half of the west half of Isabella County.

In other words, the doe-kill area is from Beal City west, through Weidman and on into Mecosta County; north through Coldwater Township; part of Gilmore, half of Nottawa, and

Broomfield.
The Conservation Department's pamphlet shows that 250 does are expected to be taken from this area, or one doe killed every 1.5 square mile. The average, of course, includes the villages of Weidman and Beal City, where

nobody expects to shoot a doe. So that the doe kill is scheduled to be heavy throughout this

area's good deer hunting places.
Local land owners feel that a committee appointed to investigate the deer-population situation here was not representative of local people, and that the decision for the doe-kill permits here was made after a spotcheck of a very small piece of land. That's the feeling, anyhow.

The net result is going to be an almost totally closed area hereabouts. Farmers and land owners who never posted their places before are posting them now. If they can't stop the killing of does here, they can stop the hunters, they say. And they will.

Hunting privileges are becoming more and more scarce for the outstate sportsman who wants to come in, wander about the woods freely and shoot deer.

This year's situation on the doe kill will button up the free-hunting stretches hitherto enjoyed by out of county hunters.

In no instance has there been

evidence of starvation of deer, or even of food shortage, sports-men say. In fact, feed is considered excellent here.

FOR THE RECORD WE HAD SNOW EARLY

STRAUS MEAT PLANT DAMAGED BY FIRE

An early-morning fire last Friday did serious damage to the smoke room and lard storage space at the Straus Meat Processing Plant.

A passing motorist discovered the blaze at 4.30 a.m., and the Weidman Fire Department responded very quickly to a call. The Strauses credit the Weidman Firemen with confining the blaze to the roof and contents of the smoke room and lard storage, and also they saved holding pens and other facilities of the Straus plant.

The Staus men had three hoses on the fire before the Firemen arrived, but could not control it. It was quickly brought under control by the Firemen, the Strauses said.

No processed (frozen) meat was damaged, they reported, and the building itself remained with only roof destruction in the smoke room and loss of hams being cured there, and stored lard, was reported. Bacon being cured also was lost in the fire.

Supplies and work aprons, and other daily working facilities also were lost in the fire. The interior of the smoke room was destroyed, with metal twisted beyond recognition by heat of

the blaze. Only the roof and rafters burned, however. The main part of the plant was undamaged, though processing will be held up this week while men do cleanup work and replace the burned roof.

The fire was being fed by a bottled-gas line, which was im-mediately disconnected by the Firemen on their arrival.

The plant is covered by insurance, the Strauses said Monday, though no estumate of damage was yet possible.

Well Drillers Must Comply with Laws

If you're having a water well installed on your property there are certain facts you should know about, according to the Central Michigan District Health Department.

Before agreeing to have someone drill a well the department says, make sure the contractor is registered with the state health department. The law requires that a decal bearing a current year date and the firm's registration number appear on the company's vehicles.

The registration provision also applies to water well pump installers, although in most cases the same firm may drill the well and install the pump.

Health department engineers advise that the well casing terminates at least 12 inches above ground level. This will protect the well against any possible source of contamination, such as flooding, and also make it easy to locate it if there is any trouble.

Well pits are no longer permitted under the new rules unless approval is first obtained in writing from local health officers. Only in special rare instances will such approval be granted. The problem with the use of pits, according to public health officials, is that they accumulate all kinds of debris and are susceptible to flooding. A flooded pit is a serious health hazard and in addition causes economic losses due to burned-out motors.

State law also requires that a well must be located at least 50 feet from any source of contamination, such as a septic tank, subsurface disposal field, dry well, outhouse or barn yards. The well driller must provide the customer with a copy of the water well record showing the complete history of the well and pump installations. The driller must also file copies of the record with the local health department and the Michigan Geological Survey.

If the well has been improperly installed, first contact the driller who did the job. However, if there is still a problem, call the local health department. The department will require the driller to correct any work done not in accordance with state law.




