FEDERAL MONIES GIVE SCHOOL NEW PROGRAMS

(Editor's Note: Last week we began an account of programs now available and in the planning stage for Chippewa Hills School District, and we ran out of space and had to continue the article.

(Herewith is the remainder of the federal monied programs at Chippewa Hills School, continuing description of programs for indigent students.)

The major portion of the grant will be used to operate a special educational program for 20 high school students. Special permission has been granted to hire two certified teachers and two male aids to work with the boys.

The 20 students will be divided into two groups of 10 each. A male aid will be assigned to each group. The group will spend half its day in a classroom with a teacher with a social science background, and the other half of the day will be spent out on the new school site with a teacher with a vocational agriculture background.

Objective in spending this amount of time and money on 20 students is to broaden their vocational horizons, provide new incentives for learning, expose them to practical experience in various vocations and help them find success in a school setting. Behind all is an effort to help each student improve his self image.

The grant of \$46,787 has also helped the school fulfill its Title I project, which has been approved for \$92,000. Under Title I the school wrote a program attempting to take a holistic approach to educational problems of children. For example, if a child has a reading problem, he may also have some problems in other areas; or he may have social psychological or physical problems. Through Title I the school was able to hire people to work on language problems, math problems, social and psychological problems. Under Sec. 4, the school has a school nurse to help with some of the physical problems.

In all, grants from Title I and Sec. 4, which total about \$135,000, have enabled the school to add 10 full time professional people directly serving children and parents; four part-time professionals, one part-time administrator, one full-time secretary and two male aids. A graphic arts program is also being developed.



WEBER'S SAWMILL HAS SPANKING NEW PLANT--Above is the 50x128-foot new building of Weber Bros. Sawmill a mile north of Beal City. It's an imposing building, finished in steel corrugated turquoise-blue siding and plenty of space inside to house the mill's automated machinery plus a new log peeler from the Morbark factory at Winn.

The Weber Sawmill is owned and operated by three brothers, Ben, John and Ed Weber. They have been in partnership since 1956. They have their new building completed now, and plan to move machinery in from the old plant some time this month.

"This building is probably bigger than we need right now, but we're building for the future, too," Ben Weber told the Messenger reporter. Straus Bros. Contractors poured a cement floor for the huge interior, and the building is now completed.

Lumber from the Weber Mill is bought mainly by furniture makers, with a current run on elm for pianos.

They are getting what they can of diseased but not dead elm trees hit by the Dutch elm disease. Their market for furniture lumber is mainly in the South, Ben Weber said in an interview.

(And a word from Ye Ed to fireplace users: No more slabwood from local sawmills. With the Morbark peeler in use, mills now sell slabwood to pulpwood manufacturers.)

THE SHERMAN CITY SCHOOL--In 1902 or 1903. Mrs. Ethel Bywater worked diligently with us, as did also Mrs. Mary Otterbein of Mt. Pleasant, and Bert Estes of Brinton, to draw together some bits of history of the days when Sherman City was a thriving town. They have given us many priceless old photos, which we hope to print from time to time; and this picture of the "new" school at Sherman City shows the spacious and sturdy building erected after a cyclone destroyed the first school building. The Sherman City School Board planned this building carefully, using big timbers and extra-strengthened walls to withstand any possible big wind. This school, a fine one in its day, was later torn down and another built. Today there is no evidence of any school building in the area.

In the 1890's, Sherman City was a bustling, thriving village. It boasted, among other things, a post office, hardware store, implement store, two sawmills, a creamery or cheese factory, a grist mill, three hotels or boarding houses, a blacksmith shop, a meat market, grocery store, doctor's office, a Masonic Hall, and other buildings. In 1901, when Mrs. Bywater's parents, the William Hatchers, located in Sherman City, the town already was disintegrating as timber harvests were completed in that area. Now there were only two stores left, and a doctor's office. The Masonic Hall was abandoned. Today Sherman City is a small group of pleasant homes in a setting of green fields, a charming picture, but an amazing one. Little trace of the once-live Sherman City is visible today.

POST OFFICE WARNS ON DAMAGE TO MAIL BOXES

The post office said this week that parents and teenagers should be aware that willful damage to mail boxes or mail receptacles is a federal crime.

The federal law provides that anyone who willfully or maliciously injures, tears down, or destroys any mail box or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail on any mail route, or breaks open the mail box, or willfully or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited in the mail box, may be fined \$1,000 or imprisoned for up to three years.

The post office also said that, under Michigan law, parents may be responsible for vandalism attributed to their children.
