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#### Editor's Column

ONE DAY THERE'LL BE NO NEWSPAPERS

As one strike after another puts big-city daily papers out of business, this country is facing the very real future of one day having no newspapers at all as we know them.

The Detroit newspaper strike is the second those papers have weathered, and no newspaper, even a big-city daily, operates far from the red side of the ledger. One day there will be no daily newspaper from Detroit.

Or if there is, we shall have no choice as we have heretofore enjoyed. There's a rumor going around that "the unions" want only one paper in any major city. That day is fast approaching.

One day there will be no local weekly papers, either. When the present crop of oldsters now running the weekly papers is gone, there will be no one to take up cudgels for civic progress and against civic errors. The young editor and publisher will not work that hard for the pittance a weekly newspaper yields.

No young "editor" is going to
put in the mental effort that Joe
Grim puts in, for instance, writing his weekly editorial page in
the Farwell News. After the mental effort comes the physical
work of setting the editorials into type and making up the editorial page for the paper. That's
a lot of work--and there's no
profit in it. No editor expressing his personal views can please
all of the people all of the time.
Most of the time an editor gets
brick-bats for his honesty in expressing his views.

The modern trend is to free distribution: "Boxholder, Occupant, etc.," on third-class mailing pieces filled with advertisements. There is no way to combat this. It is the "in" thing

Other factors, perhaps accidentally, contribute to the eventual demise of second-class matter which is newspapers and magazines.

We have a complaint from Dollie Bowers of California, who wrote asking for the two issues of the Messenger during the first two weeks of November.

"They deliver our first-class mail all right, out here, "Dollie said, "but we have an awful time getting our newspapers and magazines. I don't know what's (Continued on Back Page)

Rusty is healthy and definitely grown into a man. Withal, he is the same friendly, affectionate boy, but maturely grateful to be alive and back from the war.

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Rusty's last assignment in Viet Nam was at Chu Lai, 60 miles south of Da Nang, and he drove three-quarter-ton trucks over the Viet Nam roads mined every night by the Viet Cong and mine-swept every morning by Americans.

"The VC come in at night and plant the mines," Rusty told us. "We send mine-sweepers out each morning before the trucks move out, but still there are mines on those roads, and we have many casualties. Those roads were sure getting bad for trucks being blown up, towards the last I was there," Rusty said.

Just before Rusty left Viet Nam the Marines moved out of Chu Lai and the Army moved in.

Rusty will leave the first of next week for California, unless his application for a five-day extension of his leave goes through.

He will go to Camp Pendleton, Calif., to await discharge March 10. On release from the Marines, he plans to go back to his old job at the Olds plant in Lansing.

Asked if he felt the cold here, after his long stay in the steamy jungles of Viet Nam, Rusty said, "Well, yes, I feel it a little. It was worst when I arrived in Detroit, on coming home. I thought I was freezing when I got off that plane."

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Airmail cards and parcels should be mailed to servicemen overseas no later than Dec. 11 to assure before-Christmas deliv-

Don't forget to use ZIP Codes on all your Christmas mail, in both the address and the return address. Only you can put ZIP into your postal system.

All gifts should be packed in sturdy boxes. Cardboard boxes should be wrapped in heavy paper and tied with strong cord.

Don't let any gifts rattle around in your Christmas mail packages. Sufficient cushioning is important to give the box strength. There may be a set of the encyclopedia in the box on top of yours.

Each package you mail should include a slip showing the person receiving your Christmas gift and listing the contents. In case outer wrapping of package comes loose, your gift will still be delivered.

In addition to articles normally prohibited in the mails, matches and lighter fluid may not be

mailed to overseas military addresses.

Make sure your addresses are written or printed clearly and that they are complete. Don't let your mail end up in the Dead Letter office because your handwriting can't be read.

Gift parcels to distant states should be mailed by early December, and those for local december, by Dec. 15

livery by Dec. 15.

Don't forget that under normal conditions there is no delivery of cards and letters on Christmas Day other than Special Delivery.

Greeting cards with a five-cent stamp may be sealed and contain written messages. They are given priority in delivery and forwarding.

Remember to mark all mail for which you have paid special charges with the type of handling it should get (airmail, Special Delivery, Special Hand-

ling, etc.)
You can write DO NOT OPEN
UNTIL CHRISTMAS on the outside of a Christmas package that
goes through the mails. If a letter is enclosed it must be noted
outside the package and firstclass postage should be paid for
the letter, in addition to the parcel post rate.

During the week just before Christmas long distance gifts and greetings should be sent by airmail to assure on-time delivery.

You can help the post office by separating greeting cards into local and out-of-town bundles. Labels are available for this purpose at the local post office.

Check the return addresses of the people who send you gifts and greeting cards and add their ZIP Codes to your mailing list. ZIP Code your responses to them for better mail service.

The Weidman post office will remain open until 4.30 p.m. on the following Saturdays in December: Dec. 9 16 and 23.

Harris took the cloth, waved an S.O.S. The little tug pulled us eight miles to Conklin Park for repair.

While the motors were being fixed, we fished from the dock. Thirty-six perch was our catch.

Harris pilots his own boat, although Annetta is a good helper; and the next day we fished Lake Coeur d'Alene for Kokanee, getting 59.

Their fishing is done by trolling. It is just a good nerve tonic for everyone to visit and fish with these good people.
