LET'S LOOK AT THE BEAUTIFUL BLUE BROCHURE

Have you studied Daverman Associates' detailed plan for "Proposed New High School" on the front page of the expensively-printed blue brochure "presented by the Boards of Education of the Barryton, Fouts, Mecosta-Remus and Weidman School Districts"?

We took a good look at the elaborate layout, and concluded that the "proposed new high school" is an expanse of roofs, roofs. This will provide work for maintenance men for many years.

ance men for many years.

The complex is all one-story,
necessitating a heating plant that
can push heat over an area of apparently an acre or more.

We could see no evidence of windows on the main structures. That will necessitate artificial lighting at all times.

Notice the great area of smooth beautiful lawns. There's a good full-time job for someone. Such lawns must be cared for.

That's just looking at Daverman Associates' drawing on the first page. (Incidentally, who hired Daverman Associates, Inc., to draw plans for a school building not even in the voting stage yet?)

One last look at the first page. It says, "Proposed New High School: A Message to the Voters. And, "Vote Feb. 11, 1967, on this Important Issue."

You will not be voting on a proposed new high school Feb. 11.
You will be voting only whether or not to consolidate the four school districts into a Big-Big district. That's all.

If the vote is favorable for consolidation, another election will be held in an attempt to vote a bond issue to build the new school. In this bond-issue vote, only taxpayers can vote. In the Feb. 11 election, you can vote if you merely live within the district: renting, board-and-rooming, owning but tax-exempt and so on. But on the vote to provide money to build a new school, only taxpayers may vote. And that's a horse of a different color.

Page 2 of the Beautiful Blue Brochure contains rosy promises of the perfect educational dream. But we ask, how can these four school boards promise these things? For if the consolidation vote is approved, these boards would immediately be liquidated and all decisions would be made by a new board governing the entire area.

WINTER GRIPS IN BLIZZARD

Weidman was buried in snow drifts during and after last week's record blizzard, but we did well, at that.

No accidents here were reported, no fires, no emergencies.
Weidman people just stayed at home, riding out the terrific storm, and after the roaring wind subsided, started digging out.
The Weidman School opened

Friday morning but closed at noon. Regular sessions were resumed Monday.

Isabella County road crews did heroic work trying to keep roads open in the county. Not much could be done till after the wind died down, as the two-day blizzard packed powerful gusts that sent snow into drifts blocking all highway traffic for a day or so. Nevertheless, by Sunday we had most main roads passable, and most side roads dug out by Monday.

R.D. and Ronnie Sprague spent Saturday night at the Co. Road offices, to be available in case of emergency needs. Other road workers put in late hours, working till dark, and then on Saturday and on Sunday, plowing out the roads.

Weidman area people took the storm sensibly, apparently, for we had no reports of heart attacks suffered by people shoveling snow, no auto accidents here, none of the usual catastrophies attendant upon a winter storm of that magnitude.

Winter was staying with us on Tuesday morning, however, with more snow but no wind. Roads were reported slippery in most areas of the county.

Mail service was paralyzed between Lansing and Mt. Pleasant, resulting in a two-day lapse of trucks between those points. Mail began to be received at Mt. Pleasant Saturday night and Sunday, according to reports, and local citizens enjoyed a three-day supply Monday and Tuesday.

The Weidman rural carrier did not go out last Friday, but made partial rounds Saturday.

All in all, this area did well in a national emergency caused by one of the worst blizzards in history.

items on Page 3? Let's look at them:

WHERE WILL WE BUILD? "Located at a near central point of the consolidation...."
What does that tell you? Exactly nothing.
HOW SOON WILL WE BUILD?

"As soon as the needs of the newly consolidated district are known...."

Does that tell you how soon we would build? It tells you nothing. WHERE WILL THE CHILDREN IN

GRADES K-8 ATTEND SCHOOL? "As much as possible in an existing school." As much as

possible. What does that mean? HOW FAR WILL THE CHIL-DREN BE TRANSPORTED? "As short a distance as possi-

ble...." No comment. And the answer to the next, WHAT WILL BE DONE WITH THE THE EXISTING SCHOOL BUILD-INGS? is a masterpiece of pedagogical obscurity. It tells you

exactly nothing.
And next, still on Page 3, the facilities to be included in the proposed high school: We repeat, these school boards can honestly promise you nothing, because they will be disbanded if the consolidation is voted in. Their laborious plans for "26 Teaching Stations" with subjects listed, are wasted work, for they will have no power to implement them if we consolidate.

Now let's turn to Page 4. HOW WILL THIS PROPOSED BUILDING BE FINANCED?

"By a bond issue of approximately \$2,250,000 (two and a quarter million dollars) to be repaid over a period of 26 years."

It goes on to say that the proposed consolidated district will have a vlauation of \$26,000,000 and a tax of 6 mills will cover the cost.

But let's look at this again. Six mills on \$26,000,000 comes to \$156,000 per year. Multiply this by 26 years and you get a total of \$4,056,000 total pay-out by the taxpayers for a two and a quarter million dollar school.

We urge you to do this multiplying yourself, on the school boards' own figures. It's not a two and a quarter million dollar school they're speaking of, it's a four million, fifty-six thousand dollar school.

We wind this up (finally!) with our own experience in dealing with Big-Big district efficiency. We received copy for the election advertisement appearing in this issue, with a note from Earl F. Lickert, Deputy Superintendent of the Mecosta-Osceola Intermediate School District. Mr. Lickert said, to the Weidman Messenger,

"Please print this in the February

2nd and 9th issues of the Barryton Press."
