The work detail for the meeting was installing a new push-button for the siren. It was installed on the outside of the Fire Hall.

Other Firemen removed a pressure hose reel from the big truck, as it had been working hard. They cleaned and repaired it, and this is a dirty job, with oil, gas and grease. Yes, you guessed it, there are always one or two Firemen who come to the meetings with good clothes on. We had one, and he got squirted with messy black grease on his good pants. But, as our Firemen are used to this, he took it in good stride, and wiped off what he could get of it, and let it go.

Fire Chief Ed Fox and Walt Smith went over the big map, putting up names on places that are vacant, with the help of different Firemen who know the areas.

The trucks were all checked over for oil gas, etc., for when we get a fire call, we want everything in working order.

During the checkout, a spotlight was found to be out of order. This was repaired.

A bad spot was located in one of the pressure hoses, and a splice had to be made. In making a splice of this kind, it takes man-power and strength. To make the job faster and easier, the Firemen bought a vise, with money from the slush fund.

We have Firemen from all walks of life, with different talents. These talents come in very handy, and the Firemen do most all of the repairs on the trucks.

Take into consideration this point: If, every time some little thing went wrong, we took the truck to a garage for repairs, and maybe had it held up for a day or so--we couldn't give the Weidman area very good fire protection if it was needed during this time.

From time to time little things come up to be repaired, like a bulb, fuse, a hose connection, etc; like a person who owns a car, these little repairs come up, and here is where the Firemen's slush fund comes in, the money that is raised by the Firemen through the help of some business people, like putting on an auction sale of White Elephant articles and some new articles. The money taken in on such a sale as this all goes into the Firemen's slush fund.

Rev. Schmeltzer performed the ceremony before an altar decorated with bouquets of red and white carnations.



and were organized, Mr. Ervin said, three to four weeks ago.
