YOUR SCHOOL TO CONTINUE AS IS, IF CONSOLIDATION IS TURNED DOWN SATURDAY

The question of what happens to the Weidman School if the Big-Big District consolidation issue is turned down in Saturday's election has been put to us, and at first we couldn't answer. So we called James Knapp, Isabella County School Commissioner.

Mr. Knapp said the Weidman School would operate just as it has in the past, in that event. It would stay as it is, he said.

We had heard reports that The State would step in and "put us where it wants to," in case we failed to consolidate with the Mecosta County schools. Mr. Knapp said this is totally erroneous.

Under Public Act 289, made law by the legislature of 1964, there are two "units" of action, Mr. Knapp said. The first was the Ultra-Big Area of the entire Mecosta-Osceola Intermediate School District, taking in great areas including Evart and Big Rapids.

The second unit is the one we are voting on this Saturday, that is the proposition to consolidate the Weidman School District with the Barryton-Mecosta-Remus-Fouts Districts. If this is defeated at the polls, then nothing hap-pens. The State can't tell us where we're to send school children, Mr. Knapp said.

If a school district is not satisfied with its status, he said, it can ask the State Board of Education to sanction a consolidation vote or election. But The State will not and can not step in and "put us where it wants us."

The coming vote on consolidation with the Mecosta County districts completes the powers of

Act 289, Mr. Knapp said. It has been pointed out that the Weidman District, if given time, can satisfy State requirements of acceptable education in our local school. The Weidman area has three lake resort developments in progress, one of them huge; and in a foreseeable number of years we will have a tax base that can take care of educational needs in the Weidman School.

This column was written after local citizens had called the paper asking what happens if the consolidation is turned down.

Well, that's it. Nothing happens. And, according to Mr. Knapp, we'd have time to develop our local resources for taxation purposes for our local school.



In the Editor's Mail To the Editor:

I attended the meeting held at Mecosta concerning the state law Enforced Re-organization Act, which was by the Act to expire on or about Dec. 13, 1966, ac-cording to the law: Six months after the first vote on the Act. (Par. C, Sec. VII, P.A.289 of 1964, Method No. 2.)

It was apparent there that those proposing compliance with this re-organization act are not entirely in accord, on their ideas. Some are evidently for a new

school building, others are quite evidently not so much for it. If the re-organizers can't agree on what they are for now, I won-der what kind of confusion will

result later on. One thing is plain: The people

who must pay, the children in-volved, any of them, do not have any assurance of anything regarding the results of re-organization, except that: That is what it is.

We don't know if, when, or where there will be a new school. She spent the evening with her Also, it is unknown what kind of, brother, Glenn Gray, and family.

or which subjects, more or less, than we now have in each school, will be.

It is said there will be 26 teaching stations. A station is not made clear as to what it is; maintenance and administrative positions appear to be included as teaching stations. Take out the janitors, clerks, cooks, etc., and I can not see any more teaching positions than we now have in each of the schools, certainly not any more subjects, perhaps not as many.

Are the re-organizers, adver tising, maintenance and adminis-tratice positions listed as teaching stations? It would appear so.

Is it intended to operate all four schools at a lower level than they

are now? I wonder. There appears to be much dis-approval in all districts involved. Remus voted the last re-organization issue down, as did Weidman and Barryton. Mecosta had a very strong No vote. The total of No votes in the now proposed area was more than the Yes votes.

This evident disapproval in all districts involved, and the lack of accord among the re-organiz-ers, I believe, definitely indicates a very poor basis for re-organization in this area, and mer-its a strong No vote on this issue of re-organization, consolidation or whatever it may be called, for this area.

I believe that we might better keep what we have than exchange it for the indicated chaos, which also indicates to me much expense but not much benefit.





MANISTEE—A Circuit Court injunction has been granted here to stop an election on whether Filer City and Newland School Districts should be joined with the Manistee School District. The vote had been scheduled for Jan. 16.

Judge Charles A. Wickens ruled that holding a public hearing on the second reorganization plan advanced by the intermediate school district's K-12 committee was mandatory under the K-12 reorganization law as was giving a prior notice of the hearing. Wickens also ruled that holding the election within six months of the first election was mandatory.

For these reasons he s a i d that "to permit an election in violation of the law would be for the court to breathe life into procedure which was illegal".

The injunction was asked by the boards of education of the Filer City and Newland School Districts on the grounds that the election did not fall within six months after the May 16, 1966. defeat of a proposed calling for a single school district for all of the area within Manistee Intermediate School
