Fire Chief Ed Fox said Monday that \$750.00 was realized from sales of only part of the items donated by the public.

There were so many items left when auctioneering was stopped at 1 o'clock a.m. that the Firemen are planning another auction sale April 8, also on a Saturday night, at the same place.

The hard-working auctioneers, Ted Smith of Weidman and Bob Myers of Rosebush, got fabulous prices for everything sold.

Highest price for a single item was \$47.00 for an antique parlor table donated by Blanche Cliff. An antique gun, circa 1876, sold for \$17. Another old gun sold for \$21.

Baked goods went especially well, one loaf of home-made bread bringing \$5. Other loaves of bread brought all the way from 50 cents to 75¢. Decorated cakes, made by a group of local women under the guidance of Lela Johnson, brought from \$2.50 to \$5.00 each. Cupcakes also brought good prices.

Everything imaginable was on sale, Ed Fox said, from pledges of one day's work by individuals to loads of barnyard manure to be spread on gardens, to a very small pig that brought \$21; there was a 12-pound loaf of bread that brought \$4.50. There were such items as a cream separator, not seen much in these days; a small puppy, "half German Shepherd and half neighbor dog," that brought \$1; and everything in between, from household items to washers, electric stoves, and the like.

We understand a clothes dryer, another electric range, and a washer are among things to be offered at the April 8 sale, besides hundreds of other diversified items.

The new home is on the exact site of the old Peter Tilmann house, which the Webers tore down in August, 1964. It has an accompanying area of 40 acres.
