WEIDMAN LAKE DEVELOPMENT GETS SPRING START: Willard Searles, developer from St. Johns who is doing the developing of Lake Weidman, the old Mill Pond, had nine huge earth-moving machines at work Monday of this week, and was going strong as we went to press.

He is working on the Don Alwood place this week, which abuts on part of the Ptak place and will constitute a subdivision of Lake Weidman. The giant bull-dozer shown above moves several tons of dirt at a whirl, and all of Searles' machines are of that proportion.

The Weidman lakes projects took big steps forward this week, with Searles' moving in for serious work on his Lake Weidman and the arrival of the plat for Subdivision No. 1 of Lake of the Hills, Allen Lumber Company's project on the west and north direction from town.

The first plat of Lake of the Hills is duly recorded in the Register of Deeds office at Mt. Pleasant, along with building restrictions for the lake.

Waterfront lots are now available to buyers, for the first time. Loose ends were being tied this week by the developers and land owners, and lot sales will be released this week.

The first plat for Lake of the Hills lies mainly on the Walter J. Smith lands, with some on Wendell Drallette's, some on Calvin Ohls', and a small portion on Roe's Acres.

Excavating and cleanup work has been carried out through the winter on the upper reaches of the lake, to the northwest. It is expected the whole lake bed will be cleaned out and ready for permanent flooding this sum-

The area was shocked and saddened by her death.


She was born April 15, 1910, and was 56 at the time of her death. She was a lifelong resident of this area.
