Ground-breaking ceremonies at Lake Isabella, the multi-million dollar project southwest of this village, drew 42 automobiles with an estimated 125 people in attendance Monday afternoon.

The lake, when completed, will be the biggest body of water anywhere around this section of the state, with a huge dam holding back 800 acres of water.

A golf course, club house, air-strip and marina are part of the overall plans for the project.

Richard Tilmann, president of Isabella Development Corporation, was host Monday afternoon along with Leo Gatehouse. The ceremonies were taped and filmed for radio and television stations.

Filling of Lake Isabella is scheduled for June, 1968. A great deal of work already has been accomplished on the huge project. --0--




