WEIDMAN ART STUDENTS PLACE IN COUNTY SAFETY POSTER CONTEST

Eleven students of the Weidman Community School had their posters accepted among the 75 chosen for preliminary judging May 2 at a Safety Council meeting at the Court House in Mt. Pleasant. Over a thousand posters were turned in for judging by children from the schools in Mt. Pleasant, Shepherd, Beal City and Weidman.

The Isabella County Safety Council is sponsor of the poster contest, and the 75 initial winning posters were hung on the wall at the court house Tuesday evening for parents and Council members to view.

Frances Tranbarger, Art teacher at the Weidman School, said this week the children have been working for weeks on their posters, and that she told them that originality of ideas and slogans would be the key.

"Any familiar or time-worn slogans, if turned in here, will be tossed into the wastebasket," Mrs. Tranbarger warned the children. The result was a gratifying number of highly original and effective themes and slogans, she said.

"And, along with their thinking about safety in the home, at school and on the street--the kids learned a little about Art," she concluded.

Children through Grades 1 and 6 made posters for the contest, the first that the County Safety Council has sponsored. Other poster contests have been nation-wide.

Doug Marsh, Stephen Rice, 1st Grade;


