YOUR DOG MAY BE PICKED UP IF RUNNING FREE

There's a county law against dogs running loose, with or without licenses. In Weidman the situation is perennially bad, according to Mt. Pleasant officers.

Sherman Township Constable Don Smith reported last week he has had several complaints about dogs running through prized flower beds and breaking down plants.

That's not as bad as running deer, but it is equally illegal. If the public really wants to be rid of stray and wandering dogs, the public will have to be willing to call a law officer, give their names as complainants, and register a complaint against specific dogs. Don tells us that those who called him last week complaining about dogs ruining flower beds would not give their names even to the constable.

The public will have to back up its law-enforcement officers, if the public wants results.

We ourselves will report any dog on our place, and will sign a complaint, after what we went through last fall watching two dogs chasing a mangled deer.

After that, we do not believe in wandering dogs. Stray dogs, by their very situation, should be taken in by the dog warden and put to death; or, in the case of a worthy but homeless dog, a home may be found for it--by

the dog warden.

If we truly want to be rid of all kinds of trespassing dogs, we've got to be willing to enter complaints against specific dogs. If we're afraid of hurting someone's feelings and refuse to complain legally--then we'll have trespassing dogs.

They are not happy dogs, or they'd be kept at home with their families. They can do considerable harm, from ruining flower beds to killing deer in packs.



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ANYBODY REMEMBER JACK LEARY?

Rosie Hogen was visiting her uncle, Art Kent, in Grand Rapids, recently, and came upon an old letter from Jack Leary to Rolla Roe, which Rolla Roe subsequently printed in the Messenger. A clipping was pasted in Art's scrapbook.

We were asked if we remembered Jack Leary, and we said, we were fourteen years old at the time the letter was dated, but the name was familiar, and that was all we remembered.

Well, we inquired a little, and it seems that Jack Leary was a detective, and he came to the town of Weidman, and promptly fell in love with the area.

Jack Leary died possibly in Detroit, and was brought here for burial in Fairview Cemetery. There are those who can lead you to his grave. It has a flag on it, we're told, as he was a veteran, apparently of the Spanish-American War, for in 1916, the year his letter to the paper was dated, this country was not att war-quite--in World War I.

Detroit Jan. 24, 1916

Never have I seen expressed in so few words, such a world of truth and feeling. Terse, understanding, and to the point. The enclosed certainly expresses the heartfelt sentiments of at least one wanderer: For wanderer I am, so long as stern fate decrees that I remain away from Weidman.

As a roamer up and down the highways of this old earth, it may, to some, seem strange that my fancy should be held by a little town at the end of a "one-way railroad". But to me, having experienced the daily contact with the natural, wholesouled folk there, it is the most natural thing in the world.

I came a stranger, to most a mystery, and met only kindly regards, and interest, a friendly sympathy and understanding and spirit of good fellowship that captured my regard and holds it willing prisoner.

For in Weidman I found my kind of people. Weidman is home, and in all the rest of the world I am a stranger.

I am just in receipt of the first

I am just in receipt of the first number of the Messenger to gladden my eyesight for a long time, and trust that I may not miss a single copy in the future.

The very advertisements have a personal note, recalling as they do the many happy hours spent with the authors. And what memories those names do conjure up.

I'll tell you, Mr. Editor, that when that great day comes, when dreams and wishes come true, I'll gladly trade my castles in Spain for the chance to come

back to Weidman and be "Just Jack".

With a word of good wishes for Weidman, and for you, and with the earnest wish that I may greet you more personally about the time trout-fishing gets ripe.

Very truly yours, Jack Leary.

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GOLDEN MEMORIES OF CASE SCHOOL

By Frieda (Schneider) Schaupea graduate of 1925.

(Editor'w Note: The following nostalgic account of school days in the Case School was read at a reunion of that school by the author.)

Memories are what we store in our minds--mostly as children or in our youth. Who can deny that anyone who attended the Case School at any time in their lives has but fond memories of that period and really enjoyed a privilege that very few enjoy in this present day? The privilege of going to a country school where the three "Rs" were taught with vigor and lasting qualities. Where they learned respect for their country and flag, and sang the hymns each morning, that represented the history and culture of these United States.

Remembrances of the teachers are filled with admiration and awe, at their ruggedness and stamina to endure the hardships they faced--getting to school in all kinds of weather, their capabilities in coping with children of all ages, from very young to grown teenagers, their versatility of interests and knowledge, great enough to meet every challenge.

Children nowadays would consider the country school a hardship when compared with the heat-controlled rooms, modernized facilities and school buses to transport them to and from the schools. How could one make them know what they are missing or have missed, in not knowing a school like our beloved old Case School?

Reminiscing brings back the miles walked to get there, some farther than others, but far enough to have the chill winds cut your face on a blizzardy mor ning, the frigid cold creep through your heavy coats and stockings and underwear on an icy morning, and the frost nip your toes and fingers so when you got to your destination you were blue and stiff. But on the warm days, what glorious times to play in the deep snow banks on the way home, finding the deepest one, or making snow-angels in a patch where no one else had been During lunch time and recess time, everyone would rush out after eating a hurried lunch carried in a tin bucket, to slide down the hill which was directly in front of the school towards the road, with the flagpole set right at the bottom of the hill. Many times someone would head right into the flagpole and take a good spill. Not everyone had a sled, and the kids would pile two or three deep on the sleds to get a ride down. How many remember sitting on the big old coal schovel and riding it down, straddling the handle, with another smaller child on their laps? And at night the kids would carry water in

every available bucket and splash it on the hillside so it would be good and slippery for the next day. Then there were the games of "fox and geese" played on the fresh snow.

Remember the spring days when you would take time to find pollywogs in the water down in the swamp, go looking for the first trailing arbutus blossoms, see the birds' nests take shape and later take peeks in to see if there were any eggs, and still later to see the birds that were hatched when the eggshells were found down on the ground. Picking the first May flowers, wintergreen berries, etc., when taking a short cut through the woods. As soon as the weather permitted, to play in the school yard such games as "pom-pom-pullaway,"
"May I?" or "anti-I-over" the
woodshed. There was a short stretch of sidewalk in front of the wooden porch which ran across the front of the building, where the girls skipped rope or played jacks on the porch. The older children found so much enjoyment in playing baseball. It seemed the game never ended. When the bell rang, everyone would rush back to classes and at noon and recess they took their positions just where they left off and the game went on. The big trees served as bases. Sometimes everybody would go down the road a way and slide and jump down a big sand bank on the side of the road.

Who can forget the Christmas programs with the huge Christmas tree and real candles lit. The last day of school programs, the picnics with freshly squeezed lem onade and home-made ice cream, the ice being then brought in a buckboard wagon covered with sawdust straight from an ice-house, that had been stocked with ice cut from the lake in the winter. And, the luscious cakes the mothers used to make--real cakes, not from a package, with thick, rich frostings.

These are only some of the happenings that each shared in. There were many incidents, joys and sorrows, that had their effects individually, but all were a part of forming hardy, honest people with basic fundamentals. As the years slip by, contact with teachers and schoolmates may be lost but in memory each has a spcieal spot and there is a kinship that will not be lost.

I personally am grateful for the opportunity of sharing the "togetherness" of the Case School Reunion, and I hope you have the same fond Golden Memories in your hearts too.

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HISTORY OF

By Fred L. Kent OLD DAYS IN SHERMAN CITY

The following historical account of Sherman City, written by Fred Kent, was printed in the Oct. 15, 1953, issue of the Weid man Messenger. It was among a package of old Messengers sent us by Nelson Wiley of Pontiac, who came upon them while gath ering up treasures such as this which had been kept through the years by his wife, Îzora.

In the 1953 edition, the Editor's comment says the article was brought to our attention by Jessie Rosencrantz, to whose attention it was brought by Mrs. Ella Denslow, who had a copy of the original printing of the Fred Kent piece, in the Weidman Messenger of Rolla E. Roe.

We print it again, as it is very valuable historical material, and we feel that contemporary citizens should know about the beginnings of our township and its

various villages.

BY FRED L. KENT James Cotter was an early resident of Sherman City, and drove tote teams for Amos Johnson, hauling goods from Stanton, and later, from Farwell. He moved to

Idaho, where he died many years

Postmasters of Sherman City were Amos Johnson, Gilbert Johnson, James H. Tinker, J. Mon-

roe Kent, and John Cameron. Eugene Walker of Coldwater carried mail on horseback from Mill-

brook.

Wesley Ellis carried mail from Farwell; Wilson Parmenter was mail carrier from Farwell, Chippewa Station, and Two Rivers; John Kent, Sr., from Mt. Pleasant, and Robert Aylsworth and John Ferguson from Two Rivers.

Before the G. & A. Railroad was built, two surveys were made to Sherman City. One survey was by way of Horr, and the people were called upon to contribute \$5,000, which was voted at a meeting of the electors of Sherman, in the store building later occupied by Emory Leiter of Drew.

The amount called for was voted, but Rosebush and Clare got the railroad.

Later, Gilbert Johnson and John Gilbert Johnson and John Cameron secured the right of way for the F. and P.M. from Brinton to Sherman City, and the company then turned them down.

Dr. Barry soon after selected this place as the terminal of the Mecosta branch, but, disappointed in their former efforts to secure a road, they would offer no inducements, and the road was built to Barryton.

The present school house at Sherman City was built in 1879 by Charles Cole, contractor, and John Thompson, Sr., assistant. The first school house in the

township was at Sherman City, one-half mile south of the present site, then a frame building was erected and blown away by the cyclone of Sept. 19, 1878. It stood on the site of the present building.

(Editor's Note: We have noticed several allusions to "the cyclone of 1878," which leveled, apparently, Sherman City. If anyone has information on that cyclone, we'd like to print it.)

Ministers of early days were Asa Swem, M.E., 1870; James W. Thompson, F.W.Baptist; 1877; Dr. Degroat, U.B., 1876; Chas. W. Gardner, U.B., 1880; and James Morden, 1890.

Doctors who have practiced in Sherman City were Degroat, 1876; Hughes, 1877; Sherlock, 1879; Taplin, 1884; Wenzell, 1889; Charles and Harry Soper, 1893; and Dr. Rondot, 1908.
