# Editor's Column

HEARTENING WORD FROM CONGRESSMAN CEDERBERG

In a news letter we received recently from Representative Elford "Al" Cederberg, our area man in the United States Congress, were the following paragraphs of information. We feel they are heartening to earnest patriotic Americans for their intent to decently consider the monetary plight of this country, and for Congressman Cederberg's will to follow a decently sensible line of reasoning.

Here's his letter, in part; and we earnestly urge our readers to take the time to write him and let him hear from the folks back home. His address: Congressman Elford A. Cederberg, 2303 Rayburn Bldg. Wahington, D.C. 20515.

"Taxes: President Johnson is about to propose a tax increase. At this writing the exact amount is unclear but it appears the minimum request will be a 6 percent surtax. (Ed's note; A surtax is a tax laid upon a tax.) The cost of the war in Viet Nam is only one reason for the requested increase. Non-defense expenditures have risen even more than defense costs.


"Since 1960 the population of the U.S. has grown 10%. During this period the personnel comprising the civilian federal bureaucracy has grown 25%, and the cost of federal payrolls has expanded 75%. Federal spending, overall, has grown 83% since 1960. Non-defense expenditures have risen 97% during this period, while defense has gone up 68%.

"Welfare spending is up 21%. Deficits for the eight years, including fiscal 1967, will total 50 billion dollars, and will reach at least 75 billion dollars before the decade is over. The national debt will rise nearly the same amount.

"In view of these facts, I have opposed many programs and voted to reduce the cost of others. It seems to me, in the light of these fiscal problems, that it is essential to reduce domestic spending and, where possible, reduce military expenditures.

"I opposed the last income tax reduction because in my judgment it could not be justified in the light of Great Society spending requests. It is my present intention to oppose a tax increase now unless it is clear that some effort will be made to delay new programs and reduce other costs."

BUILDING SITE CHOSEN FOR NEW HIGH SCHOOL FOR BIG CONSOLIDATED DISTRICT

The interim board of education of the Chippewa Hills School District agreed last week to purchase 279 acres known as the Root farm in Mecosta County, for construction of a new high school building if the voters approve a bond issue at the forthcoming school election Aug. 28.

Price of the property, owned by Mr. and Mra. Zane May, is set at \$31,000. It is located about a mile south of the Air Line Road on M-66.

The site is located 4 1/2 miles from Remus, 5 1/2 miles from Barryton, 6 1/2 miles from Mecosta, 8 1/2 miles from Weidman, and 9 miles from the little Fouts district.

The interim board also agreed to contact the owner of a church on the corner of the proposed site to secure a possible purchase of that land.

The interim board decided to ask the voters for 3.7 mills for operational expenses, a definite lowering of this millage in this area.

Tom was shot in the abdomen, left hip, and right leg and foot. The telegram said, in part, "His wounds are not, and we repeat, are not, serious. No further word will be sent."

Dianne was advised that she could write Tom at the 67th Evacuation Hospital, APO San Francisco, Calif., 93618. Tom's friends are urged to drop him a line at that address.

He was with B Company, 1st Battalion, 8th Infantry, Inf. Division. He has been in the thick of action in the Central Highlands in South Viet Nam for some time.
