By Connie BE SURE TO VOTE NEXT MONDAY IN THE SCHOOL ELECTION

The School Election for the big consolidated district, Chippewa Hills, is next Monday, Aug. 28, at which time a bond issue of well over two and a half million dollars will be decided.

Also on the ballots is a request for an additional 3.7 mills for operational expenses of the new district.

Millage on the bond issue is quoted at 6 mills, for a period of 26 years.

Also on the ballot will be the permanent school board candidates. Note that there is no contest for the one-year term and the three-year term. Four seats will be filled, with only four candidates to fill them.

There are contests on the twoyear terms, where three candidates are running for two seats. On the four-year term, four candidates are running for one seat.

So--study your ballots carefully There are seven men to be elected. The only contests are for the two-year and four-year terms Be sure and vote.
