AMERICAN ELM DOOMED BUT THERE'S A SUBSTITUTE

Our American elm trees, some a hundred years old and huge, some younger and oh, so graceful, are on their last roots, so to speak, in Isabella County.

Michigan is very hard hit by the Dutch elm disease, worse than New York State where the disease started its march across the nation, we are informed.

We cannot save our Amerivan elms. We can only have them removed after the disease does its work.

There is a substitute tree, and Ye Ed has often wondered why plant experts and government experimental stations don't put forth effort to refine and change it a little by scientific breeding.

We're referring, of course, to the Chinese, or Siberian, elm, a fast-growing tree which, properly trimmed and cared for, attains fully as graceful and satisfying form as the American elm.

This is not to say that we don't weep for the American elm. Of course we do. Nothing can really take its place, but the Chinese elm, trimmed to its ears when young, grows very like the American elm, and is so very fast-growing that you can plant a tree, enjoy it for 20 years, and remove it if you wish, and start again.

The Chinese elm is impervious to the Dutch elm disease, and so far as we know (who have them all over our place), is resistant to the ever-growing number of insect pests attacking our trees. The only insect we've known to damage or destroy the Chinese elm is the rose chafer when it attacks in hordes, as it has a few times in the Weidman area. Those stinkers eat leaves of the Chinese elms, and we have lost one tree, and the Doctor Clarks in Weidman lost at least one. But that's the only insect we know of that damages the Chinese elm.

Like we said, the American elms have had it. No use to plant young ones, the Dutch disease will get 'em. It seems to us the sensible thing is to plan on a substitute tree. And the nearest thing to an American elm is the Chinese, or Siberian, variety.

\$2,000 REWARD OFFERED IN AREA WIFE'S MURDER

The Post Office Department announced this week it will pay a reward not to exceed \$2,000 arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the murder of Mrs. Nola Puyear, wife of Paul E. Puyear, a parttime resident of the Barryton area

Mr. Puyear owns a house trailer and lot on 45th Avenue near Barryton, and has spent most weekends throughout the year there for the past eight or nine years. He is well known to residents of the Lake, Barryton, Chippewa Lake and Mecosta areas.

Mrs. Puyear was killed instantly at 9 a.m. Aug. 18 while opening a parcel post package delivered to her minutes before by a postman. The package contained a home-made bomb, and was addressed to the Puyear residence. 857 E. Michigan Ave., Marshall. However, due to a previous arrangement made with the Marshall post office, the Puyears received all mail at a cafe owned by them, known as the Tasty Sandwich Shop, 209 E. Michigan, Marshall.

Mrs. Puyear was blown to bits, while Mr. Puyear was slightly injured. One of three customers in the cafe also suffered minor injuries.

Investigation has determined that Mrs. Puyear received another package in the mail a few months ago which contained poison pills. Handwriting experts have determined both parcels were addressed by the same person.

Due to the Puvears residence in the Barryton area, postal authori-ties believe it probable that persons in this area may have some

information valuable to the case. Postal Inspectors advise that any information received will be held in strictest confidence, both as to the nature of the information given, and the identity of the person furnishing it.

SCHOOL ANNOUNCES ADULT CLASSES Plans for the Chippewa Hills adult education program were an-

nounced this week by Charles Pelham, Assistant Superintendent in Charge of Instruction.

The program includes adult school-completion courses by correspondence from the American School of Chicago, and "enrichment" courses for adult who have completed high school. A general meeting for all interested persons will be held at the Remus building Thursday, Sept. 28, at 7 p.m.

Adults wishing to enroll in the high school completion courses must register at the Principal's office at Barryton, Mecosta, Remus or Weidman schools before Sept. 29, Pelham said. Registration may be by mail or telephone if adults are unable to register in person.

High school completion enrolles will complete four units of credit in a 38-week period. They may continue and qualify for a diplo-ma when credits are acquired.

Costs for these courses will be paid through state financial aid. Students will pay a small fee covering supplies.

Typing I and sewing will be of-fered as "enrichment" courses, for which students will pay approximately \$10.

Classes will be held one night per week at a "central location" for the largest number of students They will run from 7 to 9 p.m.

Correspondence courses also may be taken for "enrichment," with the cost covered by the student.

Corresondence courses include chology, short-hand, typing, eti-quette, home management, Know Your Car, practical English, and others for women.

For men, courses in automotive maintenance and trouble-shooting, welding, Know Your Car, electricity, sheet metal, blueprint reading, machine shop, math, and others, are offered. Pelham said that expansion of the adult education program will depend largely on amount of interest shown this year. ---0---




