VERA TVORIK NARROWLY ESCAPES IN STORM AT FRANKFORT SATURDAY

Mrs. Vera Tvorik paid us a call Monday afternoon to tell us of her frightening experience while fishing for coho salmon on a pier at Frankfort when the devastating storm hit that area Saturday.

They arrived at the pier at 7.30 in the morning, before daylight, and the weather appeared normal.

"It was cold, but there was no indication of a storm," Mrs. Tvorik told us.

Boats of all descriptions and all sizes were streaming out into Lake Michigan, she said, right down to a 10-foot craft and one canoe. Whitecaps were showing while the boats went endlessly out, she reported.

Winds rose steadily, and the waves got higher and higher. At about 10 a.m. some of the boats started coming back in, yet, she said, there were still boats going out, in the face of rising winds and waves.

Mrs. Tvorik's party on the pier noted that waves were becoming higher, and finally, about 10 o'clock, one wave crashed against the pier and almost engulfed it. The wave following that one washed over the pier where the party was standing.

They grabbed frantically at their gear, lunch, her camera, and saved everything they'd brought with them, but barely got to shore ahead of the deadly wave.

Boats were streaming back in from the lake, she said, "But I know there weren't as many . boats came back as went out," she said.

"I've never been in anything like that kind of water, " she continued, "I never was close to waves so high and dangerous. I never came so close to being washed off a pier and onto rocks below, in my life. I love fishing, but not that much."

Winds and waves appeared to be worst around the lighthouse on the point where boats had to pass to get back in from the lake.

The storm was not predicted by weather bureaus, and apparently was a freak situation of wind and water on Lake Michigan. Dark storm clouds were appearing as Mrs. Tvorik's party left Frankfort around noon.

She said the coho salmon rush is one of those phenomena that happen when something new breaks on the public.






