The Weidman Lions Club is footing the bill and doing the work--not a small project, for there is much to be done for the pavilion, which is used constantly through spring, summer and fall by clubs and families for reunions.

The Lions Club men work on the picnic tables at the park every year, repairing, painting, and keeping them in top shape. This year they have some extra work to do on these, as Hallowe'en pranksters damaged some of the tables.

The Lions hope to complete the east side of the pavilion this year. They have further plans, for closing in the south side, with a big door on a track to allow for repair and delivery trucks. They hope to correct the fireplace at the north end of the pavilion—it doesn't draw well, and indoor heat and cooking is difficult as the fireplace now stands.

To obtain money for this civic project, the Weidman Lions ran the concession stand at the park last summer, as well as the softball games. They made some profit from this.

They say the biggest part of their year's profit is tied up in their supply of brooms and light bulbs not yet sold. The Lions held their annual light bulb sale

Oct. 25, but they have many yet to be sold. You can get yours at the Pitts Radio and Television Store in Weidman.
