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Christmas Cards Postage 6 Cents

The postoffice advises persons sending Christmas cards that all cards must carry six cents postage except postal cards and post cards, which may be sent for five cents.

In previous years unsealed Christmas cards without written messages could be sent for one cent less than first-class postage. These would be delivered as third-class mail, without provision for forwarding or return.

Legislation now in effect raises the single rate third-class postage to six cents. In effect, so far as Christmas cards are concerned, the first-class and thirdclass rates are the same.

All greeting cards bearing six

cents postage will be forwarded if a new address is available, the postoffice says.

The department stressed the importance of a return address on all Christmas cards, to assure that undeliverable cards may be returned. This allows mailers to keep their address lists up to date.

To the people of your area I would like to address a letter, and I feel through the Messenger it will be the most convenient, expedient and reliable way for me.

Dear Messenger Readers: Since July, 1967, I have been in New Mexico working with the Navajo Indians at a Bureau of Indian Affairs high school. We have 1,000 students in grades nine through 12.

From September until June they live in the dormitories, while the faculty and staff live at a housing compound adjacent to the campus. Because of the geographic closeness and absence of their families and home lives, we work closely with the students during evening hours, weekends, and vacations.

Most of the students have nev-

Most of the students have never spoken English before their attendance at school; many have never been more than 50 miles off the reservation. It is amazing how quickly they learn things we take for granted—things they have never been exposed to because of cultural differences.

After completion of high school many students attend trade schools or colleges. Of these students, a large percentage do not complete the course of study, due to their inability to adjust to Anglo society.

In the classroom they are successful, but they fail to comprehend the idioms of the English language, the mannerisms of the people, or to understand the structure of our society. They do not feel at ease on a campus, in a job, or in a situation where the major culture is alien to them. These things-idioms, mannerisms, structure and culture-they cannot learn in the boarding school.

I plan to return to Michigan for six to eight weeks next summer to attend summer school, and would like to bring a few students along if we can locate some families who would like to provide an Indian a very profitable experience, and, hopefully, at the same time provide their own families an unforgettable summer by allowing the students to live with them.

The pay need not be large, or maybe nothing, depending on the situation. The work might consist of housework, farm work, baby-sitting, waitress, gas station attendant, store clerk, etc. The rewards from intracultural

exchange should be interesting to both the Navajo and the Anglo.
