YOU CAN HELP SAVE THE AMERICAN DOLLAR

On another page of this issue you will see an advertisement by Liberty Lobby protesting an upcoming vote in the United States Congress which would do away with the 25 percent gold backing for Federal Reserve notes, leaving America with absolutely no gold backing on its currency.

gold backing on its currency. (We didn't know, either, that our currency had any gold backing since Franklin D. Roosevelt took us off "the gold standard". But there has been a 25 percent requirement of actual gold bars behind Federal Reserve Bank notes.)

You all know that the gold reserve at Fort Knox has been depleted to a disastrous low level. If this bill is passed by Congress, there is nothing to prevent this country from being without any gold at all.

We would have real paper dollars, worth only what they could muster in the way of faith of the people for backing. There would be no check on printing-press money--and we have serious inflation now.

According to pamphlets from Liberty Lobby (which we believe are correct), we now have ten billion dollars in gold bars at Fort Knox backing the Federal Reserve currency. This is our only national supply of gold.

Foreign countries, notably France, have demanded gold for American paper dollars, and they have got it. Our gold supply at Fort Knox (or wherever They have it now) is at its lowest point in history.

The United States has poured untold billions into "foreign aid" and other programs draining our own resources to the advantage of other countries. We have "commitments" that would make the ten billions in gold disappear in a wink, with foreign nations demanding gold in payment of our "obligations".

If America goes completely off gold backing of its currency, the foreign speculators, meaning nations, could double their money in the gold speculation; for we could no longer command the price of gold, and it would undoubtedly rise.

For the ten billion in gold bars, if released from its tie to the (Continued on Back Page)

SOME SHERMAN CITY HISTORY (Editor's Note: The following is from a letter sent this paper by Mary Otterbein of Mt. Pleasant, describing a picture she enclosed with the following information on early days in Sherman City:

I am sending a picture I have discovered. It is a picture of Louie Mindel's store. It was built quite some time before 1900, by Gilbert Johnson. It formerly was a two-story building, but a cyclone came through and took the top story off.

Mr. Johnson then finished it to a one-story building, for fear there might come another cyclone.

He ran the store until the early 1900s. Then George McKane of Barryton bought it. I don't remember the exact dates. Later, Louie Mindel bought it, and he had it quite a number of years. There were a number of people that owned it after that, but Sherman City was losing so many people and businesses, and the bigger stores were coming nearer; also, cars were getting more plentiful, so the store wasn't doing so well.

Mr. and Mrs. Herman of Sears came down and bought it, and that is where Harry Herman was born. Mr. Herman passed away, and Mrs. Herman moved the store

supplies to her home and kept store there for a number of years. The house can be seen in the background in the picture. It was formerly the Gil Johnson house.

Frank Williams ran the store for a while, and after it was closed Frank tore it down and took it to Grand Rapids to help build a store building there.

Mr. and Mrs. Mindel are standing to the right in the picture, up on the steps, just before the door or in front of the door.

Then I don't know who stands next, but the next person after that, a large man in a white shirt, is Mrs. Mindels' father, John Gingrich, or Daddy Gingrich, as he was known to most of us. Mary Otterbein.

And we have the following history writing from Ethel Bywater, on some of the old buildings in Sherman City:

A Masonic Hall, built in the heyday of the timbering business in Sherman City, when Sherman City was booming, was later abandoned and remodeled into the present old church building.

One of the four store buildings on the west end of Main Street was being used for the Maccabee Hall, while another building, of a smaller size, was moved and attached to the back of the Mac-

cabee Hall to be used as a dining room and kitchen. Later the Maccabees disbanded.






