WEIDMAN STATE BANK BROKEN INTO EARLY SATURDAY MORNING The Weidman State Bank was

broken into about 3.30 Saturday morning, but the would-be thief knocked off the combination knob on the outside door to the bank vault and set off the bank's outside alarm bell.

The alarm woke Jim Clark, at his home at the back of the IGA store next door. Jim called the State Police, who were here in a matter of minutes, it was reported.

The police said the call from Jim came in at 3.48 a.m.

The would-be bank robber fled when the alarm started sounding, but he left nothing behind to in-

dicate identity.

Though the robber broke off the vault's combination-control knob, and started to drill through to knock out further controls, the drilling caused two steel bars to drop into place, locking the outside vault door. Inside, there is a key-operated fire door, and inside the fire door are two combination-operated safes. The safe containing cash amounts has a time lock that makes it impossible to open it before 8.30 in the morning.

Entry was gained by prying open the back door of the bank, after an attempt apparently was made to jimmy the front door. The robber did his work under a flood

light which lights the interior of the bank all through the night.

The outside alarm went on ringing from 3.30 a.m. to about 10 a.m., when bank people got a workman from the alarm company to disconnect wires. Otherwise there is no way to shut off the alarm, bank officials said. The alarm is battery operated, and, as Leon McArthur said, it must be a pretty good battery to keep going for over six hours on

straight running.
This was the first attempt of robbery at the Weidman Bank since 1920, Leon McArthur said. By Tuesday of this week, State Police reported they and the FBI were working on the case. Leon McArthur, president of the bank, said the FBI took over the ruined

parts of the combination knob.
A new knob has been installed on the vault, Leon said; plus a new lock on the front door, which was jimmied but not opened; and a new door installed at the rear, where the would-be robbers tore off the door to get into the bank.

I want to thank you for sending me your views on the so-called "gold cover" legislation. This measure was presented to us for a vote in the House of Representatives on Wednesday (Feb. 21) and I voted against it. The measure passed by a close vote of 199 to 190.

In my opinion there are good reasons for maintaining a substantial gold reserve. Having misgivings about the legislation as presented, I opposed it.

Some of the claims were that enactment of this bill would re-

store confidence in our international commitments. One of the most positive ways we could restore confidence would be to put our fiscal house in order by curtailing unnecessary spending projects, move toward a balanced budget and begin reducing our national debt.
