Lake of the Hills saw no development activity this winter, but the Butterfield Realty Company of Lansing has been selling lots on Plat No. 1,

At the huge project of Lake Isabella, Richard Tilmann reported that work was going ahead on the big dam, with expectations of filling the lake about Aug. 1.

Plat No. 1 of Lake Isabella is sold out, Dick said, with sales on Plat No. 2 going good at this time. Plat No. 1 had 90 lots and the No. 2 plat has well over a hundred, Dick said.
