CHIPPEWA HILLS SCHOOL DISTRICT TO VOTE MAY 6

Voters in the Chippewa Hills School District will cast ballots Monday, May 6, on a millageraise proposal for operational expenses for the coming year. The millage request is for three years.

The Board of Education is asking 10 mills extra to be voted, with 6.3 mills additional over what taxpayers have been assessed.

Places of voting are contained in an advertisement placed by the Board, in this issue.
The 10 mills demanded is a

The 10 mills demanded is a tax assessment of \$10 per \$1,-000 of assessed and "equalized" valuation of property.

Higher salaries, increased cost of transportation, supplies, building maintenance and demands for additional services are listed among causes for financial difficulties of schools throughout the state.

Absentee ballots may be obtained at the Central Administration Office any time up to 2 o' clock Saturday afternoon, May 4.

Friday, May 3, a public meeting concerning the millage vote will be held in the Weidman and Mecosta schools at 8 p.m.

Home and very happy these Men in Uniform are now being assigned to different bases Stateside to finish out their time in the service.

before going to Fort Devins, Mass., Jack, who arrived April 9, will go to Fort Knox, Ky., Noel Flaugher has 45 days' leave and is assigned to Fort McClellan, Ala., Paul Bush goes to Fort Bliss, Tenn., and Ron Loomis is assigned to Selfridge Air Base at Mt. Clemens.

Dick and Jack were in the 670th Transportation Company (which received a citation as the best transportation outfit) through the main part of their stay in Vietnam, but toward the last were reassigned to the 360th Transportation Company.

They drove supply trucks over those Vietnam roads which are prime targets for VC ambushers, at first carrying diversified cargo but later hauling only fuel, some of it very high-octane.

They are relaxed and cheerful in recalling their Vietnam experiences, and are thoroughly enjoying their home-leave, naturally.

"Time goes fast over there," Dick remarked, "I guess because they don't give you any time off. We didn't even have Crhstimas Day off."

They went on to tell how they drove fuel trucks Christmas Day, their Christmas dinner, hot dogs. Being on the road with a convoy of trucks, they missed the real Christmas dinner which most of our men enjoyed, except those "out in the field" (in combat) or those on supply lines.

Officer Rowe said that game divisions of the Conservation Departments of various states sometimes put a plastic band around necks of marked birds, and also may spray some birds with bright colors.

Seems our pair of swans was a marked pair in the research of some game division of some state or other, to keep track of the big birds in their annual flight to arctic regions.

Nature lovers here are hoping that no bird-killers get their guns out while the swans are here. The word: Please, don't shoot!

(The Conservation Department at Gladwin advises us that such pleas are unnecessary, if local people will report any molestation or killing of such federally-protected wildlife. Penalty can be up to \$100 fine and up to 90 days in jail, or both.)
