THE WEIDMAN SOFTBALL LEAGUE, PAST AND PRESENT

By John L. Forest Softball Commissioner Next Monday, May 27, the Weidman Softball League begins its 16th session at Mitchell Memorial Park in Weidman, with eight teams ready for action. Two games each night, Monday through Thursday, will be offered for viewing entertainment, at 8 and 9.15 p.m.

This sport has provided countless hours of recreation for player and spectator alike, since that long-ago summer of 1950 when the Weidman Business Association first installed lights at Mitchell Park. The field was in use almost nightly, with many looselygrouped team organizations playing games on a mutual agreement basis, as it was too late in the season to set up a formal league.

In the spring of 1951 the League began its first official season with six teams. Sponsors of those teams were McClain's Garage, Fox Hardware, Shook's Market, Beal City Merchants, Van Zandt's and Rosebush.

Some of the players who took part in that first season were Bob Cook, Harold Rhode, George Mc Clain, Jr., Leo Embrey, Orval Branson, Al Clevenger, Mitchell McArthur, Howard Kolarik, Don Alwood, Wayne Smith, Ray Smith, Harold Straus, and many others. At first the teams played only one game a week, but by the following year the schedule was expanded so that each team

got to play twice.

Much of the credit for the early success of the League is due to the efforts of Ross Momany, Sr., who gave unselfishly of his time

as player, manager, umpire, sponsor and groundskeeper. Almost any night there was a game, he could be found at the park in one capacity or another.

In 1953 he took over sponsorship of Van Zandt's team under his own name, and under his guidance the team won pennants that year and the following one.

Following his death, his widow continued to sponsor the team with the assistance of Harold Rhode and Bob Cook until 1957, when it was taken over by Walt Smith and became known thereafter as Walt's Bait Shop.

A few of the other sponsors who have been represented throughout the years have been Straus Bros., Weidman Merchants, Gatehouse Bros., Thorpe's Heating, Beal City K. of C., Dent's Market, Evart Welding, and others.

In 1958 this writer, who former-ly assisted the WBA in rules and schedules for the League, was placed in full charge with the title of Commissioner, a post he still holds.

That same year the League expanded to eight teams for the first time, but due to schedule problems was not a success, and by 1959 had once again reverted back to six teams. That year also marks the first time the park played host to the Michigan Sottball Association district tournaments. Seasonal play during that season and the following one was dominated by the Gatehouse Bros.

In 1961 the Evart Welders, who had been admitted only that year became champions, but the following two seasons saw a revived Walt's Bait Shop carry home the prized trophy. 1963 also was destimed to be the final year under the old or fast-pitch rules.

Due to difficulties in recruiting enough players, the League did not operate in 1964 or '65, but by the spring of '66 renewed interest was shown, and it was decided to revive the League, using the rules of slow pitch. This is quite similar to the fast pitch formerly in use, but it has some difference, chief of which is that the ball must be delivered at a slow speed, no base stealing is permitted, and 10 players rather than nine are used on a team. Five teams operated that season as an experiment in fan reaction.

This type of ball has caught on with unexpected success from players and fans alike, and throughout the past two seasons has been viewed by crowds un-equalled since and in many cases exceeding those of the first years of the League.
