GOOD FISHING ON LAKE OF THE HILLS--Veteran fisherman George Skinner enjoys good fishing on the lake just back of his home, as Lake of the Hills is teeming with fish of most varieties. Most plentiful species is carp, and George often hauls in 40 to 50 of these fast-growing fish in a day's time. Also good in Lake of the Hills are bluegills, perch, bullheads, Messenger photo and some legal-sized black bass.

The carp, prized as food tish by some and despised by others, is a strong fighting fish, and for pure sport is hard to beat as an angler's fun. You can have a ball bringing in a 13-inch carp, of which the lake abounds, and then you can either clean it and fry it or bury it beside some of your prized garden plants. Fish make the most perfect fertilizer available.

Lake of the Hills is providing good fishing to most tastes of the fisherman tribes, despite a fish "kill-out" accomplished a year ago. The lake is literally full of fish today.

Other lakes in the Weidman area report progress in development, with the huge Lake Isabella filling now and lot sales reported ex-

tremely brisk there. Lake Weidman, or the old Mill Pond, under Willard Searles' development, has its first plat approved and is offering lots for sale.

Excellent fishing was reported on Lake Weidman, or the Mill Pond, this week, with anglers thrilling to catches of lunkersize bluegills and plentiful legal bass. Biggest bluegills ever taken from any lakes hereabouts were reported by fishermen toss ing their lines on North Woodruff Road, at the tube under the road. Weidman's surrounding lakes are getting under way. The town




