WEIDMAN IS GETTING THE SERVICES IT NEEDS

Item by item and person by person, the village of Weidman is acquiring services it needs as a good place to live.

Recently we got a coin-oper-ated car wash; we have a coinoperated laundromat; and our local stores are adequate to the needs of local residents in anything you want to name.

Our attention was called to this Sunday, when most of the lights went off at our house, just at noon time.

It was a job for an electrician. We remembered that Lee Parker had advertised in the Messenger for work as a local electrician. We called him, and, as he is our neighbor, he came at once.

It took him only a short time to find that the gimerator in the main switch box was not functioning, and he corrected that, and charged a nominal fee.

We were two happy people, after that. Weidman rapidly is getting the vital services it needs as a good place to live.

WHAT WAS THAT RED SUNSET?

The following account is from the Weidman news written for the Mt. Pleasant Times-News dated March 24, 1947, bylined Frances Roe Tranbarger. The clipping was loaned the Messenger by Lucille Smith:

Tragedy came very close to striking a number of Weidman folks early Tuesday morning when their cars became stuck in the deep snow just west of Joe Stevens' corner, on the blacktop road. Most of these people had been working in Mt. Pleasant, and were on their way home after finishing the night shift at Ferro's factory.
The storm didn't seem so bad

when they left Mt. Pleasant, but by the time they turned west on the blacktop, they knew it was no ordinary storm. It was the worst blizzard of the year, and they were stuck with it.

There were Mr. and Mrs. Ted Smith in their car; Mr. and Mrs. Gaylord Hart, Mrs. Walter Smith, Mrs. Clyde Johnston Janet Latham, and Mr. and Mrs. Lloy Sperry, all in one car; Mrs. Etta Denslow and Mrs. Leo Denslow, and Mrs. Charles Gross and son Donnie, and Donnie Bellows, who were returning from a business trip and a show in Mt. Pleasant. The Gross car was

it was a sign of fair weather." We thought it was a sign of big storm.

Whatever it was, we got just so-so weather; but we wish we rescued by George McClain at about four o'clock in the morn-

ing.
The others, having become marooned later, had to stay until almost noon the next day.

Mr. Hart walked to the Stevens home, soon after it became apparent that it was useless to try to go any farther. He just made it back to his car, and, realizing how bad the storm was, gave orders for everyone to stay in the car until help came or the storm subsided.

A snow plow got through on the road about 10 o'clock Tuesday morning, but snow drifted in behind it immediately, making it impossible for the cars to follow behind the plow.

But by this time, most of the occupants of the cars had made their way through the huge drifts to the Stevens home, where they were warmed and fed.

George McClain, Jr., and Monty Pridgeon took the wrecker to the scene Tuesday around noon, and had to haul one car after another almost to Weidman, to get them through the gigantic snowdrifts.

Like we said, we had freezing rain, sleet, and snow- a-blowing, and roads drifted in and all that; but apparently we were not so bad off as we were that tail-end of March in 1947.

By Tuesday of this week, the vicious zero weather was relenting, with snow thawing some.

HISTORY OF THE JOSEPH SCHUELLER FAMILY

(Editor's Note: The many friends of Joe Schueller will be happy to know he was reported last week as doing fine at his home in Mt. Pleasant, after an illness.

(The following history of his family was written by Joe, and was loaned the Messenger. We are sure there are many who will be interested in Joe's account of his family.)

William and Anna Schueller, parents of Joseph Schueller, mov-ed from Westphalia, Clinton County, in the spring of 1884. They bought a farm one mile south of Beal City, in Sec. 28, Nottawa, for about \$2,500.

Joe, the youngest of 11 children, was born in 1888, in a log house on the farm. He attended grade school at Beal City, and at a school one mile south of Beal City.

John and Anna Thelen, parents of Christina Thelen, moved from Pewamo, Ionia County, to Beal City in the spring of 1900. With them came Christina, then 11 years old. She was the youngest of a family of 17 children.

Joe and Christina attended the school at Beal City, and a love matched started from school days

They were married September 7, 1909, in St. Philomena's Church in Beal City, by Rev. Father A.F. Zugelder.

To this union four children were born: Lucille, Clarence, Ruth, and William J. Lucille died when she was nine days old.

Clarence married Loretta Andres of Beal City. They have a farm one mile south and a half mile west of Beal City.

Ruth married Richard Christenson of Fremont, Mich. He is a Lieut. - Col. in the Air Force, and spent some time in Japan. He retired in 1968, and they

now live in Florida.

William J. married Virginia
Tilmann of Beal City. They live
at 1304 Lyons Street in Mt. Plea-

sant. William entered into partnership with his father in Schueller Insurance, on South Washington Street in Mt. Pleasant.

Joe and Christina lived at the farm, known as the Old Home, until 1947, when they moved to Mt. Pleasant and lived at 207

South Lansing.
Joe still owns the old home, and says he was born there and built or rebuilt every building on the place, and it is not for sale.

Joseph Schueller has held many

offices of public trust.

At the age of 20 he was elected director of the school board, and later was instrumental in creating the first primary high school in Nottawa Township. He bought the first typewriters that went into the Beal City School.

He helped organize and build the first telephone line southwest of Beal City.

He organized the Mt. Pleasant Sugar Beet Growers' Association in 1934, and later was appointed chief clerk of the Mt. Pleasant district for the government payments on sugar beets.

He was chairman of the government wheat program of Isabella County, Aug. 31, 1933; chairman of the government hog program for Isabella, Feb. 21, 1934; appraiser for Alma Production Credit Association, January, 1936; director of Farmers Mutual Fire Insurance Company, January, 1920; and secretary of that organization in 1938.

Ioe and Christina were members of the Roman Catholic Church and attended Mass regularly. Not attending Mass on Sunday was something unheard-of in this family.

Christina was a member of the Altar Society and Catholic Daughters, and was always active in church affairs.

Joe is a member of the Knights of Columbus and Holy Name Society, and also has served on the church committee at Beal City.

Joe helped clean up the debris after the Beal City church was struck by lightning and burned in 1904. He helped build or rebuild all the church and school buildings now at Beal City.

At the age of 16 he became a member of the first male quartet, singing bass. He sang in the choir for 36 years.

Christina died Sept. 28, 1966.

The Messenger folks are among the many who salute Joe Schueller on his work and achievements in Isabella County.

To get a fishing hole, a man must shovel snow from the area where he plans to fish, then cut through at least 12 inches of ice which lies under 12 inches of water on the surface.

A few hardy sportsmen have been on the lakes, but not many.
