SERVICEMEN MEET IN GERMANY

Word from M/Sgt. Ross Momany and his family from Frankfort, Germany, the last of last week was that they had finally got in touch with Gary Thomas by telephone, and they were getting together a week ago Sunday, and expected to get in touch with Tom Flower, whose address Gary has. The Momanys expected to have both boys with them for the holidays. Ruth Momany had sent her son Gary's telephone number, and he finally reached Gary and the reunion was made possible. All have been in Germany for some time.

All have wanted to get in touch with one another, but this, by a sequence of unusual reasons, has not been possible till last week when the contact was made.

Terry Schafer's mother took this picture March 17, 1968, just before he was sent to Vietnam. Since then he has earned the Bronze Star and now will receive the Silver Star, besides having three Purple Heart medals in his service in the Vietnam war.

Terry Schafer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Schafer of Beal City, has been given a Store Star citation "for gallantry in action Aug. 23, 1968." Terry is finishing out his time at Fort Carson, Colo., after spending months in hospitals for treatment of a shat-

tered right wrist and resultant tendon damage.

He was wounded shortly after going into the field in Vietnam, agash in his side giving him a four-day rest period but not hospitalization. Then he was sent back into the field, in reconnoissance.

His Silver Star citation reads, in part:

"For gallantry in action in conflict with armed hostile force in Vietnam:

"Reconnoissance--rifleman operation near Loc Ninh; A Company moving behind his element was suddenly engaged and pinned down by heavy fire from a large North Vietnam Army force on its right flank.

"His platoon moved on line to assault the enemy in order to relieve pressure on the beleaguered

company.

"During the first minutes of the assault, Spec/4 Schafer's right wrist was shattered by an enemy bullet, causing him to drop his weapon. Ignoring severe pain, he retrieved his rifle with his left hand and continued in the assault.

"He charged an enemy machinegun, holding his rifle in his left hand, and killed its three-man crew. He then picked up the enemy machinegun and continued to advance, firing it with one hand while cradling it in his injured arm.

"Spec. Schafer aggressively pressed the attack until contact was broken by the enemy, and accounted for two more enemy

killed.

"Only after the battle was over would he accept treatment for his wound."

Spec/4 Schafer is quite a man, we'd say. His citation for the Silver Star medal was mailed from Washington to his parents. He will be given a formal presentation of the Silver Star at a later date.

Terry has contacted three men from his outfit in Vietnam at the base in Colorado, all wounded, and they all feel better at getting together again. Terry Schafer and Russell Til-

McElwee put up a new building for the bakery and turned the entire second floor into an elite private hotel to the visiting celebrities of that day: Enrico Caruso, the great tenor; Will Rogers, Gentleman Jim Corbett, and others. John Ringling and his circus troupers put the Collin Street Bakery on an international basis when they ordered several hundred Original Deluxe fruit cakes destined for foreign places.

Today, successors of the deceased Weidmann and McElwee carry on the traditional excellence (and we do mean!) and flavor of the famous cake's originality as put out by the young German baker in 1896.

Mr. Weidman's gift was our dessert as we entertained at our Christmas dinner.
