Ann's plane was scheduled to put down in Philadelphia at 11 o'clock a.m. last Friday, but the airport there was socked in and no planes were allowed to attempt landings. Her plane went on to Detroit, where the same fog conditions prevailed.

Then her plane switched over to Chicago, where O'Hare Airport advised that air traffic was so heavy, due to Chicago's being clear and other areas foggy, that Ann's plane would not be able to land for several hours. In other words, it would have to circle O'Hare for hours, waiting its turn to land, among the many planes "stacked up" waiting to come down.

Her plane did not have enough fuel to circle O'Hare for hours, so it took off for Minneapolis, Minn., where it landed, fueled up, and returned to O'Hare. Ann arrived in Lansing by train

from Chicago, at 3 a.m. Satur-

day morning.


