Obituary

GEORGE W. SKINNER George W. Skinner died at the Isabella County Medical Care Facility last Thursday, Oct. 23. He was 86.

He suffered from leukemia and heart failure, and died from the latter, unexpectedly, Thursday morning.

He was born in Constantia Center, N.Y., July 27, 1883. He came with his parents to

Michigan as a small child, and his family was one of the pioneer families that took up land after the timber men from Saginaw

cut it over for the white pine. As a young man he worked in the woods as a lumberjack, and was one of the few remaining

real lumberjacks in Michigan. In the 1930's he wrote a book, The Axe Thrower of the Tittabawassee," a novel containing a great deal of authentic description of the lumbering operations. The book was printed in Rolla Roe's printshop in Weidman, and it is now on the rare-book list, as very few copies are known to be remaining.

He and his wife, Lizzie (Hamilton), ran a hotel in the old days of Brinton, and later a store. Then they bought the land known as the Skinner Fruit Farm, and the two set out small apple trees and grew a sizeable orchard.

For years they tended the apple orchard, and George worked up a profitable business selling apples bagged to retail stores over the central part of the state.

He is survived by his wife, Constance; two sons, Bennett of Swartz Creek and Harold of Coldwater Township; two daughters, Mrs. Wm. (Mary) Jones of Florida, and Mrs. Harold (Thelma) Branson, of Weidman and Florida; and 12 grandchildren, 17 great-grandchildren and four great-great-grandchildren.

He was a member of the Weidman Business Association.

Services were held Sunday at 1 p.m. at the Crittenden Funeral Home in Remus, with Rev. Marvin Eldridge officiating.


