PUBLIC LEARNS ABOUT EDUCATION "REFORM" BILLS AT BEAL CITY MEETING

At a public meeting at the Beal City School last Friday evening, a hundred interested parents and taxpayers learned about Gov. Milliken's "education reform" bills now being processed in the State Legislature.

Harmon Cropsey, legislative chairman for Friends of Michigan Schools, was the speaker, and he explained various aspects of the package of bills. He pointed out several objectionable details, not the least of which was the State's ultimate goal of do-ing away with local school districts entirely and eventually having just one mammoth "district" fot the whole state of Michigan.

Beginning with consolidations like the big district of the Chip-pewa Hills Schools, the State's goal is to whittle the districts down to 10 or 15, and eventually do away with even those and have just one huge bureaucracy for the Michigan schools.

We in the Chippewa Hills District have already learned that the big-big school district gives us no home-school, no identity either as a school or as a town. Also the edicts of the administration of a school district as large as Chippewa Hills are unknown personally to parents and taxpayers (who're they?) and school developments and activities become vague and distant hearsay to the average person.

Cropsey did not point out the above oberrvations: We did.

Cropsey did say that if he had children in a parochial school he would not be in favor of "parochaid". He pointed out that no government money is "given" without strings attached. If the parochial schools are to remain independent religious places of learning, they must not come under state or federal control.

Cropsey said that the recent passing by the state Senate on the parochaid bill would have shocked a lot of people if they had been there and witnessed the wheeler-dealer antics of the Sentate.

He also said that the proposed 16-mill tax limitation. touted (Continued on Next Page)

The directors of the Isabella County State Bank and the Weidman State Bank are pleased to announce that they have signed an agreement to merge, by exchange of stock, and operate as the Isabella County State Bank.

The agreement is subject to the approval of the several state and federal supervisory agencies and the shareholders of both banks, and will be voted upon at their annual meetings the third Tuesday of January, 1970.

It is hoped that the transfers can be completed in order that the business operation may be consolidated as of March 1, 1970.

The Isabella County State Bank was organized and received its charter on July 3, 1903, at which time the bank was purchased from John S. Weidman, who just a short time previously had purchased the bank operated under the name of Weber and Reuel, a private banking company.

In 1908, seven of the shareholders of the Isabella County State Bank, John S. Weidman, Floyd Mitchell, Elton J. Van Leuven, Frank G. Thiers, Fred L. Keeler, Arba Z. Campbell and John A. Damon, formed a partnership and opened banks at Weidman, Rosebush and Farwell.

Floyd Mitchell was named cashier of the Weidman Bank; Floyd Oliver, cashier of the Farwell Bank; and Homer Campbell, cashier of the Rosebush Bank. All the banks are now state banks.

The Weidman Bank was reorganized and incorporated as a State bank in December, 1948. Leon G. McArthur, who was with the Holmes Milling Com-pany, stepped into the Weid-man Bank for a couple of weeks in May, 1917, to give them some assistance in their bookkeeping department. He has remained with the bank and is now the president.

J. Elmer Graham, who started working with the Farwell Bank in November, 1917, transferred to the Isabella County State Bank in April, 1919, and is now the president.

The two banks have been very closely associated in their business transactions during the years of their existence, so it is only natural that they combine their forces at this time and operate as one bank.

The Weidman bank will continue to operate as usual here with no changes in policy or personnel, according to present plans. The only difference will be that the Weidman bank will have the added facilities of a big bank, million in assets.






