THE GOVERNOR'S EDUCATION REFORM

(High points of some of the bills now before the State Legislature: Courtesy of Friends of Michigan Schools, Box 1151, Lansing, Mich. 48904.)

SENATE BILL 1076: Sets up the procedure for reorganization of the state of Michigan into 10 to 15 "educational regions" by a five-member "regional development commission" appointed by the Governor. The power and responsibility for the "regional office" shall be vested in a director appointed and serving at the State Superintendent's pleasure

The "education region" is an administrative unit in the Department of Education (Lansing) with many functions, including transportation services in lieu of such services in local districts.

Each "regional" Board shall be made up of one board member from each local district, with weighted voting depending on the size of the districts.

TIMETABLE: On or after Nov. 15, 1970, a "central regional board" shall be established and a director appointed by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. July 1, 1972, the "region-al office" becomes fully operational. July 1, 1972, the inter-mediate school districts are abolished and accounts and property turned over to the "regional" office.

SENATE BILL 1081: Reorganization Bill. It establishes a State Reorganization Committee the same as in the 1964 K-12 Act. Two new terms are introduced:

"Eligible Districts" (eligible for liquidation): Districts that have less than a K-12 program OR LESS THAN 2,000 STU-DENTS. (The 2,000 and less student schools are the ones nearest the people, and the ones do-ing the best job of education for our kids.

"Designated Districts": Districts selected by the state committee to develop a reorganization plan with one or more "eligible" districts.

The state committee shall identify all districts marked for oblivion.

The board of an "eligible"

At that time no one dreamed of the Mill Pond becoming a prime recreational area some time in the future. In 1893 to 1908, the only reason for the Mill Pond's being was to float logs for the Weidman Mills.

Actually, debris such as that shown above makes for good fishing lakes. A "cleaned-out" lake bottom has no place for fish to hide from predators and for bottomland creatures that make for fish food to thrive on.

A lake with a truly "clean" bottom is a good place for swimmers and skiers, perhaps, but not for fishing.

The desolate Mill Pond stands useless and ugly, after its draining last June when the east dike gave way in two places, at least one place being where Willard Searles had dug out the original dike built by John S. Weidman in 1893 (without an engineer and the high-falutin' handsprings we go through nowadays!) and which had held through worse floods than last June's.

Word has it that Searles planned to rebuild the dike, do some further removal of larger stumps, and be ready to flood it again by spring.

We can only hope he will get at it.
