Pvt. and Mrs. Wallace Skinner disappeared after leaving Weidman the afternoon of Jan. 4, and have not been heard from.

They said they were driving through to Fort Sill, Okla., to arrive Sunday night for him to report for duty. They proposed to drive straight through, without stopping over night.

Pvt. Wallace Skinner is listed as missing from Fort Sill; though of course there is the remote possibility the young couple might have met with foul play, on their long drive to Oklahoma. Wally's grandfather thinks this might be the case.

Like we said, this is hard to write. But, to retain its integrity, the Messenger must report it with sorrow. We feel we must report it in order to re-assert our admiration and respect and affection for those of our local boys who answer their draft calls and serve their country with honor.

We do not "believe" in the Vietnam war. We think it is a crime in that it is an undeclared war and unconstitutional; it was determined by one man, the President of the United States, not by Congress after deliberation.

But we do not advocate action outside the law, and we do not believe that evasion or perversion of the law is the way to express opposition to the Vietnam war.

We do believe in the Constitution of the United States; and we die a little inside each time we see the Constitution put aside again and America infiltrated with left-wing, Communist, one-worlders, from the lowest order to the top echelons.

Like we said, this is hard to write.
