The presentation was made by children of the Beal City Parochial School. The students made a presentation speech which was appreciated by all.

Father Neubecker has a cottage at Leland, 26 miles north of Traverse City, and we can wish him good fishing on the rare occasions he gets to enjoy it.

Bill Wentworth was program chairman, with help from many others.

Ladies of the Altar Society were charming and efficient hostesses, serving coffee, punch and cookies from a table decorated with a red and yellow centerpiece of flowers, flanked with yellow candlesticks. A large gold-colored cake was also a feature of the celebration.

Father Neubecker attended schools in Beal City and Weidman, as a child. On graduating from the 8th grade he entered St. Joseph's Seminary in Grand Rapids, in 1912. In 1918 he went to St. Mary's Seminary in Baltimore and in 1920 entered Sulpician

Seminary in Washington, D. C. Feb. 3, 1924, he was ordained by Bishop Kelly and said his first mass at the Beal City church.

He was sent to Cadillac then as assistant, and remained there four and a half years. Aug. 1, 1918, he was sent to Beaver Island as pastor, where he stayed until October in 1931, when he was sent to Charlevoix as pastor. In 1940 he went to Lake Leelanau and remained there as pastor till May of 1946, when he came to Beal City, where he is still at his post, beloved and respected by all who know him.

says: Dear Helen and Family:

Just received your second paper and letter. Thanks so much. I really want to keep in touch with friends I have made in Michigan, Kentucky and elsewhere.

As I sit writing you, I am looking out at the beautiful ocean. It is really a lovely blue today. It has been very warm here, but we are in the 80s today and 60s at night, really ideal. I have the doors and windows open.

We had a lovely Christmas. We gave a party for the company employees, about 20 people, some Puerto Rican. Christmas Day we went to the beach for

swimming.
This is ideal for living, if only they would keep the island clean! You can't imagine some of the conditions that exist here.

I went to Kentucky in September, sold the house and furniture, drove to Jacksonville, Fla., put my car in port for shipment (it cost a small fortune to get it here), but it is well worth it. I have learned to drive as they do here, that is, to the point of cutting in and out of traffic. Such traffic. You have never seen anything like it.

Beth is in the Inter American University. She has made the first semester okay. You see, she went to summer school and graduated, so she is a Freshman in college. She loves it there.

I'm waiting now for her to come home. She stays in the dorm. She is going with a boy whose mother is American, his father a Puerto Rican. He looks American, speaks both Spanish and English fluently. We are picking up phrases as we go along.

Beth goes to college in San German and Connie (Clevenger) in San Juan, quite a distance apart, but from where we live it is only about 60 miles to San Juan. We go down often shopping, and I will try to get in touch with her.

Beth brings girls home for the

weekends. They are from the States and get lonely.

Ralph is fine. I think he is re-

juvenated since he came down here. He is in charge of company operations of the rigs, like he was there, so he doesn't have to work so hard. He loves it here and we plan to stay a few years.

However, you probably will see us in November, as we plan to come up for deer season. He has missed two years and it is about all he can think of missing. His sister is still in Ithaca. Jim and Susan plan to come too. We will have to buy winter clothes when we get there. We certainly don't need them here. Jim and Susan don't have any children, much to my sorrow. I have spoiled their dog.

Do you ever hear about Frances Going? I have lost touch with her. Where is Lillian Johnston now? How is Claribel Beutler, and Lucille Smith? And give my love to Kit. I see her name in the paper.

Tell Rusty to come see us. He would have a ball, lots of American girls here would really fight over him. I can't say much for the Puerto Rican girls, besides, parents are very strict with them and they must have a chaperone, like one of the family, when they court.

This is the first year I haven't seen snow, but I don't miss it, except at Christmas. You should have seen the island at Christmas, it was beautiful. They really celebrate the 6th of January, Three Kings Day, as their Christmas, in fact they start Dec. 16 through Jan. 6. A long celebration.

Well, my family is home and supper over. We're going down to the shopping center, which is much like the ones in the States. We find most anything we need--except Ralph's Mail Pouch!


