Editor's Column

"ST. VALENTINE'S DAY
MASSACRE OF THE TAXPAYER"
Early in February the United
States Congress voted itself a
hefty 41% increase in pay, and
Rep. Durward Hall (Rep., Miss.)
dubbed it a "St. Valentine's Day
massacre of the taxpayer."

We agree.
Congressmen's pay was raised to \$42,500 a year; cabinet members came in for a raise from \$35,000 to \$60,000 a year; associate justices of the Supreme Court were raised from \$39,500 to \$60,000 a year; and the chief justice of the Supreme Court got a raise from \$40,000 to \$62,500. Federal judges and other executive officials received smaller,

but sizable, pay hikes.
Then Congress voted itself a nice 10-day vacation.

It also was preparing to raise the ceiling on the national debt by billions of dollars. It also was preparing to extend the "temporary" 10% surtax it stuck the taxpayers with in 1968.

The pay hikes took effect Feb. 14--Valentine's Day. Lyndon B. Johnson had sent a

Lyndon B. Johnson had sent a recommendation to the Congress for these pay raises before he left the White House. Under a unique legislative procedure, if either the House or the Senate had vetoed the recommendation the pay hikes would have been killed. LBJ gave our lawmakers too easy an excuse for appropriating great gobs of money from our taxes to their own pockets.

An article in the New York Daily News says that taxpayers in that state are flooding Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller with tea bags, "in a not-so-subtle show of their displeasure at his planned 1% sales tax hike."

The News goes on to say that a Syracuse, N.Y., man thought up the campaign as a means of reminding the governor of New York State of how Boston residents displayed their anger at tax boosts back in 1773.

The News remarks, "If it keeps up, Rocky won't need a tealeaf reader to tell him that a taxpayers' revolt is brewing.
