THE BLACK SECESSIONIST MOVEMENT

The end of this country as a free nation is indeed near when newspapers such as the Detroit Free Press present, as straight news, stories of the black secessionist movement tagged as "The Republic of New Africa".

This is an organization of negroes dedicated to the overthrow of the government of the United States and the grabbing of five southern States as their "nation", sovereign and alien within the borders of the United States.

If the "movement" were sponsored by a white minority group, say the Mormons or (heaven protect us!) the Amish, there would be a hue and cry against these traitors, and also there would be ridicule.

But this is a negro "movement". Therefore, it is treated with respect while it demands the setting up of an alien country within our borders, and also the confiscation of five States of the Union.

These States are Mississippi, Louisiana, Alabama, Georgia, and South Carolina.

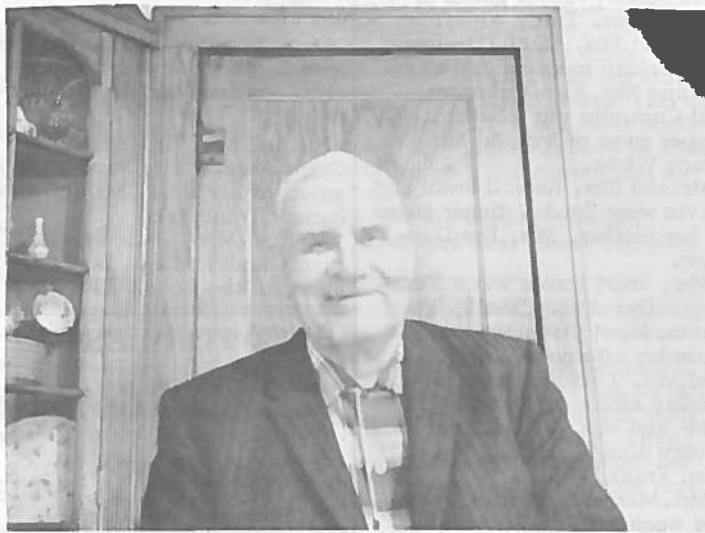
Not only do the blacks demand full and unconditional surrender of lands and properties within these States, but they also are demanding "reparations" to the tune of \$10,000 per black person.

Like we said, if any other group, like white, put forth such a monstrous demand, that group would be put down with indignation and also ridicule.

The "Republic of New Africa" is the outfit that held a meeting in a Detroit "church" recently, with armed and uniformed blacks in attendance; during the course of which meeting one white Detroit policeman was killed and another seriously wounded.

In Saturday's edition of the Free Press there was a "news" story, laid out straight-face, of "50 to 100 militant black students" at Detroit's Northeastern High school who cut down the American flag Thursday and again on Friday, and then, with the consent of Dr. John Peterson, the schools' principal, hoisted the flag of the "Republic of Africa" just below the flag of the United States.

The Free Press stated: "The militants' flag was first (Continued on Back Page)

Art told the Messenger people he treated the spider bite about 10 days, during which time the area on his upper arm looked like a rampaging carbuncle.

He finally went to his neighborhood druggist and asked him if he "had something to take care of this thing, whatever it is." "I sure have," the druggist told Art. "Advice. You get to the hospital as fast as you can. That's a spider bite, and obviously a poisonous one."

Art took his advice, went to a hospital where he was treated with serum to combat the poison of the brown recluse spider's bite, and is now recovered and feeling fine.

Mabel Chaffee accompanied Art on his visit to the Messenger office Saturday. Art was spending the weekend with Mabel and Bert at their country home on the Chippewa River.

Art was born on the county line between Isabella and Mecosta, in 1895, son of Fred Kent. There were six children in the family, with only two now alive: Arthur, and Millie Dent, of Grand Rapids.

Art was over 20 years old and married when his father, Fred Kent, ran the Horr Store and wrote the Horr news for Rolla Roe's Weidman Messenger.

Art has lived in Grand Rapids since 1918, and worked for the City Ice and Fuel Company 35 years. He retired in 1949, and now lives in Wyoming. He was 74 last Sept. 4.

CALL THESE NUMBERS, NOT FIRE DEPARTMENT, FOR BURNING PERMITS

Weidman Volunteer Firemen advise us that people have been calling the fire department or individual firemen to obtain burning permits, and the Firemen do not issue them. There are two Mt. Pleasant telephone numbers (no toll charge from here) to call to obtain burning permits:

Daytimes, 773-9965. Nights, 773-5713.

We suggest you clip these two numbers and paste them in your telephone book.

Burning permits are required only in areas outside of cities or villages. In Weidman village proper, no permit is necessary. Outside of the mile square containing the village, for instance, a permit must be obtained for burning.

Incidentally, it was pointed out to us, the only time when burning permits are not mandatory is when there is snow on the ground.

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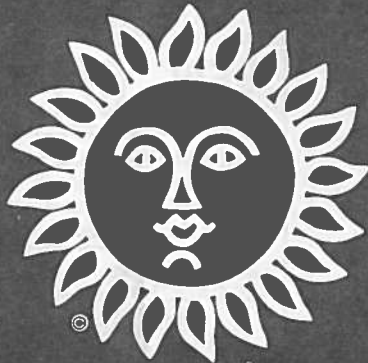
