WHADDAYAKNOW! ROLLA ROE MAKES IT TO DETROIT PUBLIC LIBRARY

Two little "newspapers" or magazines, about 3 1/2 by 4 inches page size, one hand-lettered and illustrated by Rolla Roe at age 12, will be deposited in the Burton Historical Collection in the Detroit Public Library.

It all started when Connie Roe Skinner came across one of the little booklets and sent it to her brother, Col. Charles Roe, of Tarrytown, New York, for safe-keeping for posterity.

Charles, in his eighties, is in the frantic process of finding places for HIS prized family historical collections, as well as his valuable library.

He wrote Connie saying he didn't know what in the world to do with the little hand-printed 24-page "newspaper" with its age-yellowed pages, as well as another "newspaper," printed, by Rolla Roe at age 14.

He wrote Connie that he would write the Detroit Public Library to see if they would accept the booklets or "newspapers", and here is part of what he wrote the Library:

"He (Rolla Roe) grew up to be a printer, a country weekly newspaper publisher, a true scholar and always a gentleman of the old school... In his last 29 years he was editor and publisher of The Weidman Messenger which he founded at Weidman, 15 miles west of Mt. Pleasant. He died there in 1942 at age 78.

"My sister Constance some years ago wrote a whimsical account of my father and his wanderings around Michigan with his growing family, publishing country weeklies. It was published in the Saturday Evening Post for October 5, 1946. I assume you have that number in your bound volumes of the magazine.

"If you would care to find a place for these little 'publications,' I would be happy to send them to you, together with a brief outline of my father's life and character. I could add a page or two of typed material copied from my sister's story in the Saturday Evening Post.

"Sincerely, Charles H. Roe."

VADA CARROLL

This area was saddened by the death of Vada Carroll Sunday morning at 8 o'clock in CMC Hospital, where she was rushed Thursday morning, suffering from a recurrence of infection of the pancreas.

Vada's friends are legion, and the village of Weidman is sadder for her passing. She was a devoted mother and grandmother, and a true friend and faithful neighbor.

She was born Aug. 9, 1896, in Sherman City. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Aylsworth, were Brinton resident about the time that George Middlesworth, Sr., had a store there.

Robert Aylsworth was in various businesses here, with his brother, Pete. At one time the Aylsworth brothers owned the big wooden-structured hotel on the corner where now stands the Leonard oil station.

The Aylsworths were married in Brinton, before George Middlesworth brought his "general store" from that town to Weidman. Izetta Aylsworth Drew was born here. Both Vada and Izetta grew up in this town.

Vada graduated from the Weidman High School (then across the Coldwater River and only offering 10 grades), and attended Ferris Institute.

She was employed in a bank in Detroit, where she met and married her husband, Edward Carroll. Later Vada was employed in Mt. Pleasant, and then in a government job in Washington, D. C.

She is survived by her son, Robert, of Plymouth, and eight grandchildren; and her sister, Izetta Drew, of Bridgeport, Conn.

Funeral services were held in the Weidman Methodist Church Wednesday afternoon at 1 o'clock with Rev. Lawrence Smith officiating. Burial was in the Aylsworth family plot in Fairview Cemetery in Weidman.

May found three members, Jean Smith, Wanda Graham and Besie Allen, attending the International meeting in Columbus, O., May 22-23.

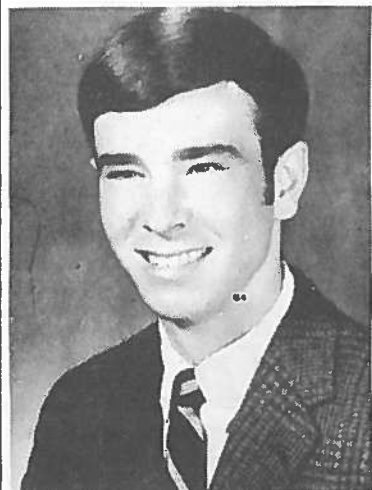
