NARROW STRIP HERE

Last Wednesday and Thursday the Weidman area experienced heavy thunder storms and high winds, the latter causing some damage in a narrow area on the south edge of the village.

Television antennae were bent and twisted. The antenna on Evelyn Hackney's house was stripped but left standing. Small buildings such as storage houses and sheds were flattened on several places.

On the west edge of Weidman a window was blown out in the home of John and Vera Campbell as the Thursday storm came suddenly upon the area.

At the Ronnie Sprague home on Weidman's south edge, a fish house filled with empty fruit jars, standing in the Spragues' back yard, or to the east, was demolished and broken glass strewn around the front yard, or to the west. The storm was from the west and southwest, and this must have been a small twister, as it threw debris to the west as well as all over their acre lot.

Other homes were slightly damaged by wind or lightning. The James Palmer home was struck by lightning in Wednesday's storm, but the ensuing fire was quickly extinguished.

Broomfield Township suffered some heavy wind losses, including two barns blown down. Mt. Pleasant also suffered heavy winds and rain.



OUR AMAZING LAWS

Any person with a previous criminal record cannot be required to register a gun. To do so would amount to self-incrimination, which is specifically NOT required under the Bill of Rights.

So says the U.S. Supreme Court in the latest and most amazing chapter of all in the controversy over guns.

This means that despite the efforts of certain members of Congress to enact strict federal registration of all firearms, the move would be fruitless. As interpreted by the U.S. Supreme Court, only law-abiding citizens would be required to register their firearms. Criminals don't have to.

It also means what a lot of folks have been trying to say all along--- that gun registration does not affect the criminal element of our society. It just puts undue burdens on the honest citizen.

Isn't it about time for Congress to quit playing patsy with criminals and get on with the real business of enacting extra penalties for those who commite crimes with firearms?

As it has been said many times before: "Guns don't commit crimes. People commit crimes." (From the June, 1969, issue of Michigan Out-of-Doors.)




