I understand you have monetary interest in the dam, and adjacent shores, and naturally will take steps to restore the waters to normal depth.

My interest is sentimental, and should you feel inclined I would appreciate a letter from you advising of plans of restoration.





(Continued from Page 1) Mr. and Mrs. Geitman had returned Friday evening after a week spent in Saginaw, and openen up their house. It was a very warm evening, Mr. Geitman said, and they opened windows immediately, and he turned on an electric fan, then went into the basement and turned on the air conditioner.

He went back up the basement stairs and got to the kitchen door when a series of three explosions ripped through the house.

Mr. Geitman ran to the west side of the house and rescued his wife, extinguishing flames over her body, and her blazing hair.

Every room in the house was on fire, Mr. Geitman said in an interview.

He carried his wife to the front of the house, at the roadside, and flagged down a car for help. He said they do not know who the Good Samaritan lady was who drove them to CMC Hospital in Mt. Pleasant, but would like to learn her identity and thank her.

They would also like to know who the man is who gave Mr. Geitman his own eye-glasses when Mr. Geitman said he could not see without glasses. "Here, take mine," the man said. "I have another pair at home." Mr. Geitman has been using the borrowed glasses while new lenses were made for him in Saginaw according to his oculist's prescription.

The Weidman Fire Department had the ruinous blaze under conurol in a short time, but the inside of the house was gutted, and the west wall of the house blown out.

All windows but one were blown outward by the blast, it was said at the scene Sunday.
