Organization. "Tomorrow, NATO can be a foundation for even greater good, if we build upon it. The spirit of co-operation among equals--basic to the NATO idea -- is already going far beyond mere military affairs.

"People are beginning to talk about the NATO countries (this includes the United States: Ed.) sharing common educational standards someday. And a common scientific research pool. Even a common currency, and common languages. (Well, Russian, anyway--the subscriber's insertion.)

"This could lead to a better life than mankind has enjoyed in all its history. For information write----." (Followed the Wash-ington, D.C., address of the Atlantic Council, whatever that is.)

Our subscriber goes on.

"That's it in its entirety; and if it's in our local daily paper, so very likely is it in every city paper across the country."

We haven't seen it in any paper yet, ourselves, but we're on the lookout.

It is well known that the forces advocating One World under the United Nations, have not ceased to work for their goals.


The teachers have the gratitude of the Weidman area community.






At the Rebekah-sponsored card party at the Weidman IOOF Hall last Tuesday, seven tables of pepper were in play.
