INTEREST ON SCHOOL BONDS TO BE MORE THAN PRINCIPAL

The Chippewa Hills School District finally sold its bonds for construction of a two million, six hundred and seventy-fivethousand-dollar new high school building, we see by the Mt. Pleasant Times-News-

Interest on the bonds is 7.0488 percent for 29 years. This means that, by the time the bonds plus interest are paid off, the new school will cost much more than twice the amount taxpayers voted in the bond election.

Total interest charges for the bonds maturing variously up to 29 years hence is put at three million, one hundred and thirtytwo thousand, seven hundred and eighty dollars.

We have not been supplied a list of teachers and employees now enjoying good salaries from the Chippewa Hills Schools, but we have been informed that the Board has hired a Mrs. Bell to gather and write the school news for the Board.

Juniors and Seniors in a school competently educating the young should be able to gather, write and deliver school news to the media under deadline. Journalism classes are not necessary for this. Any class in high school English could take it on, if students were prepared for this responsible job.

And if Juniors and Seniors are not competent to do this rather simple but important work, then they are being cheated in their education.

**** NOBODY AIN'T GUNNA KNOW ENGLISH

To get a job on a newspaper, in this marvelous modern age, you don't have to possess a knowledge of English grammar, spelling and vocabulary. In fact, you don't have to know English at all.

You need a college degree with a major in journalism.

We see this manifested daily, in the Detroit Free Press (Bob Talbert Turns Us Off with his murder of the language); and other newspapers of lesser size.

Newspapers also have dispensed with proof readers as the profession was understood in Ye Ed's (Continued on Back Page)

Mary Starr, music teacher in the Weidman and Chippewa Hills Schools the past eight years, has compiled a detailed and complete history of all the schools in the Weidman area.

Mrs. Starr's book is in fact a term paper on her work at CMU on her Master's Degree, but it is also of great importance to this locality, inasmuch as it lists the complete history of all the schools surrounding Weidman, with lists of all teachers. the years they taught, and their salaries. It also lists school boards of all years of the local schools.

It begins with the history of the Weidman School, then located a mile east of the later Weidman High School and elementary school just across the Coldwater River east of town.

It covers the country schools, their teachers and school boards. Mrs. Starr, besides turning in her effort as a term paper, has given a copy to the Weidman Public Library, the central of-fice of the Chippewa Hills Schools, the library at the Weidman school, and various individuals who assisted her in research.

Mrs. Starr is the daughter of Wilbur and Rosalie (Kaninsky) Benn of Shepherd. She graduated from the Shepherd High School and from Central Michigan University with a Bachelor of Music Education Degree. Her husband is Donald Starr, son of John and Marie (Hein) Starr, now of Saginaw. The Starrs, Sr., were well-known Deerfield farmers until four years ago, when they moved to Saginaw where he is now head

custodian of the Michigan Lutheran Seminary, a parochial high school in Saginaw.

Men in Uniform

(Editor's Note: The following is an excerpt from a letter written by Steven G. Brown, our great-nephew and son of Dr. and Mrs. Vincent Brown of Mt. Pleasant. Steve enlisted for four years in the Navy, and we are sure you will be interested in his letter.) Aboard the USS F.D. Roosevelt. Dear Family:

We've been at sea now for six days, the last four of which have really been rough. We've taken the Gulf Stream, the southern one. It winds north of Bermuda.

Anyway, this time of year there are a lot of storms in this area, and we've hit the whole lot, I think, and right now we're still being tossed around like a little runabout. This is the worst one I've ever been in.

Last night I was sitting in the chow hall when all of a sudden we took a real bad roll and all of the tables collapsed and everyone in their chairs went sliding across the the chow hall, many of them falling before they got to the other side. However, everybody "cracked up". Ha-ha. In four days we should be at Rota, Spain. Our mail doesn't

go out until then, so if you are wondering why it took so long for me to write, this is the reason.

Our first liberty port will be Barcelona, Spain, Jan. 22. This morning at 0400 we were forty miles off the coast of Rota, Spain. I went topside around 10 this morning. It was the first time in nine days.

(Editor's note: Steve is assigned to the engine room, at the bottom of the ship.)

During the night the seas calmed a bit, but now they are picking up again.

They were trying to land jets that were launched earlier, before the storm. As they were attempting to land, a Russian trawler was pulling up along-side of us, about 100 yards out, and our jets would swoop down over it.

I guess they finally decided to fly into Rota, as it was too rough to land on the ship.

It's now two o'clock and they have set the special sea and anchor detail. Some guy just came down and said we're being escorted by a Russian sub which is above water.




