LET OUR PEOPLE GO

In the all-out, professionally conducted election campaign of 1967 for the vote on erasing the Weidman School District and entering into the now unwieldy big-big Chippewa Hills Schools District, it was definitely promised that all families living on the edges of the Weidman District would be free to transfer to a district of their choice.

We clearly remember that all-out campaign, for the Messenger opposed the big-big consolidation, and we lost.

But it was stated over and over again (orally, of course, but by school-people who were trusted) that those families wishing to transfer to other districts would be allowed to do so.

There is an unhappy situation on the east edge of Weidman, where at least two Catholic families have tried again and again to be transferred to the Beal City District. They have been denied again and again.

Last fall they were asked by the Board of Education of the Chippewa Hills District to wait "until we sell our bonds" before applying again for transfer.

Now the bonds are sold, and now we shall see what the integrity of the Board, speaking of it as a political entity, amounts to.

Not only have at least two of our Weidman families been denied transfer to Beal City District, but we would say they have been harrassed for their efforts to send their children as tuition-students to Beal City while paying taxes to Chippewa Hills District.

After school started last fall, two families, the Bernard Rileys and the Thomas Schafers, were sending nine children to Beal City, with the Beal City school bus picking them up (it comes down from the north at the Weidman cemetery corners).

The parochial school at Beal City demands its students wear "uniforms," plaid jumpers for the girls, blue shirts and dark pants for the boys.

The Riley and Schafer parents had purchased the required uniforms for their children in the Beal City School.

Suddenly, they were notified

that they were breaking a state law by allowing their children to board the Beal City bus while said bus was in the Chippewa Hills District.

The Riley and Schafer children were jerked out of the Beal City school at once, their parents had to buy new clothes for them to attend the Chippewa Hills Schools, and this while they were being asked "not to apply again for transfer until we sell our bonds".

Ye Ed can say from personal experience that at least from 1912 to recent years, Nottawa and Sherman people have been friends and good neighbors.

In the old days, Nottawa was predominantly Catholic, Sherman totally Protestant.

Alexander Zugelder, Reverend Father of the Beal City Catholic Parish, and Rolla Roe, singing in the Methodist Church choir but refusing to join any church, used to get together at Rolla Roe's Messenger print-shop and belt out German songs in twopart harmony, in good German, too. Both were educated in the German language, and in music, and they had some wonderful sessions. They were friends, and also they had great respect for each other. We should be that way today.




