INDEED WE DO NEED TO GET BACK OUR SENSE OF HUMOR

The Detroit Free Press loudly advertised John S. Knight's Sunday editorial indicating that the American people desperately need to regain their sense of humor.

We were disappointed in his editorial, when it came out. We were looking for a study on how we as a nation have forgotten to laugh, forgotten to love beauty for its own sake, whether in art, or music, or the written word or any other medium.

We personally deplore the lack of appreciation for a small book written by Peter S. Beagle (of all unlikely names!), a young man in his twenties, who attempt ed to give the nation "The Last Unicorn," a fantasy for adults.

We have never seen a review of "The Last Unicorn" in any newspaper or magazine book section. In fact, we have never seen the book mentioned.

We inquired if the Mt. Pleasant Public Library has "The Last Unicorn." It hasn't. The Weidman Library will have a copy of it.

Young Peter Beagle writes not of "porn" or nudities or sex. He writes of nonsense for the sake of nonsense, and it can give you belly-laughs if you let it. He also writes with a beauty that should be envied by the "great" writers of our time, who have no beauty in their writings.

There isn't one four-letter word in "The Last Unicorn". There is no sex problem, and no sex discussion or innuendo. It is just plain beautiful handling of word-pictures, done with the abandon of a young man impatient of the time it took to get his sensitive and beautiful thoughts into words.

A butterfly, riding on the Unicorn's horn for half a day, prattles bits of gossip and Shakespeare and suddenly bursts out into singing "Won't You Come Home, Bill Bailey?" That in the days of unicorns and dragons and knights-errant.

With any other author, such an anachronism would have made Ye Ed furious. With Peter S. Beagle she laughed her head off.

The old Mill Pond is no more; we have only the creek and river channels winding their ways across the desolate Pond bed.

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Consumers Plan Area Expansion

Consumers Power Company, with a record budget of \$232 million for its statewide electric and natural gas system expansion and improvement, has scheduled an investment of \$6.1 million in its Central Division, headquartered in Alma.

The announcement was made by Ralph Hahn, division manager, who said the division anticipates adding 2,850 electric customers and 450 gas customers during 1970.

The largest single expenditure, according to Hahn, will be \$970,000 for a new Mecosta substation and transmission lines which will supply power to the Big Rapids area. Near Mt. Pleasant the Summerton substation, begun in 1968, will be completed this year. Both projects result from load growth on the company's transmission system.

Erection of two new substations, to serve the Gladwin and Greenville areas, will begin in 1970. Hahn said the Bard Road substation will increase the power supply for the towns of Harrison, Eight Point, Oberlin, Secord and Smallwood, and the new Eureka plant, two miles northeast of Greenville, will provide additional capacity for that area.

Other substations in the Central Region to undergo improvements are Breckenridge, Orleans, Rodney, Crawford, Lakeview, Bailey and Winters Creek,

Nearly \$1.4 million, said Hahn, will be spent on the distribution system which supplies electricity directly to customers, including installation and improvement of overhead and underground transmission lines, replacement and rebuilding of customer metering installations, and restoration of systems which might become damaged because of natural or man-made causes.

Hahn noted that the division budget figures do not include a \$12.1 million expenditure to be made in the western and central areas of the state to construct a 345,000-volt steel tower line. This effort is part of a vast project which links Consumers Power and Detroit Edison, principal members of the Michigan Power Pool, with utilities in Indiana, Illinois and Ohio. The line will allow participants to exchange power on a seasonal ba-

sis and provide mutual assistance in case of emergency.

Hahn said the increase in gas customers will require the laying of 14.4 miles of new pipeline to extend the present gas distribution system, and another 6.3 miles to improve the system. Direct costs of this effort will be over \$550,000.

In another gas project, more than three miles of 4-inch steel gas main will be constructed along M-46 in Merrill and Jonesfield townships. The pipeline is necessary to augment the supply of gas to the village of Merrill.

Included in the 1970 budget are funds to design a new service center in Greenville. Construction is expected to begin next year and the facility will be in operation in 1972. Remodeling of the Alma service center will start this year.

Consumers Power Company supplies electric service. through a statewide integrated network of power plants and transmission lines, to more than one million customers. Natural gas service is distributed through a network of pipelines and pumping and storage stations to more than 830,000 customers. The combined electric and gas service area encompasses all but one of the 68 counties of the Lower Peninsula
