The other suggestion Barney has is a good one; and while we have always practiced it (having been an old maid and timid), we heartily recommend it to the general public.

DR. RONDOT: A LEGEND

OF THE SHERMAN CITY AREA Many families in Sherman and Coldwater Townships have cherished tales of the valor and determintation of Dr. Rondot of Sherman City. Dr. Rondot celebrated his 100th birthday last week, and memories of his visits to snowbound homes around here are vivid.

He answered all calls, which were mainly house-calls. He had a faithful mare that took him and his sleigh in winter as far as a horse could wade the drifts, and then Doc would continue on his way, on snowshoes.

Time of day or night did not matter. He visited many a family in the early hours of morning, at midnight, at 10 p.m., or of course in the daytime.

He was a good and effective doctor, too, as many will testify in the area.

Gerald Dent tells of the time when he was eight years old and suffered appendicitis. It was wintertime, of course (many crucial illnesses seemed to occur in winter), and Dr. Rondot diagnosed Gerald's illness correctly at the Dent home, but he wanted the small boy to be taken to

a hospital for surgery. The roads were blocked with snow, however, and Gerald's parents could not get out to take him to a hospital (probably at Big Rapids, in those days).

After a couple of days' illness, Gerald had a burst appendix, considered fatal in those days before antibiotics.

Dr. Rondot treated him as best a doctor could without surgery, visiting him every night after all his rounds to other patients; he went on snowshoes, sometimes arriving at the Dent home at 2 or 3 o'clock in the morning.

He pulled the eight-year-old Gerald Dent through. After Gerald was married he went to a hospital for surgery, and doctors were mystified at the fact that he had no sign of an eppendix.

Dr. Rondot, on hearing of this, remembered that burst appendix in an eight-year-old boy, and figured out the mystery, accounting for the absence of an appendix in a grown man, years after the boy's burst appendix caused so much anxiety and attendance.

Dr. Rondot brought Gerald Dent into the world. Austin, his older brother, did not come into the world with Dr. Rondot's attendance, as his mother said Dr. Rondot was "new" in Sherman City at that time, and she'd rather have a known physician. Dr. Rondot was also in attendance at the birth of Gerald's wife

Mabel (Kirvan), and also for Gerald and Mabel's daughters, Evelyn and Geraline. A first ba-Virginia, died. by,

Last Wednesday the Austin and Gerald Dents and daughter, Evelyn Roberts, asked Dr. Rondot, April 12. "Oh, yes," Dr. Rondot said, "over 200 came to see me, some

from California."







for a boy there was suffering from pneumonia. Doc went on snowshoes most of the time, and it is doubted if he was ever paid.

Mabel Dent tells of a time when Evelyn was a baby and Doc told her to open up a Sears-Roebuck catalogue, lay it on the kitchen wood-range and heat it, then put it under the baby's blankets.

"It kept warm all night," Mabel says now. "Of course we didn't have hot-water bottles in those days, and how Doc knew about the catalogue I don't know."

There are countless accounts of Doc Rondot's medical feats, his miles of trudging through the night, his good-natured friendliness.

Truly, he is a man of legend, and in his own time.

He spent 42 years doctoring at Sherman City, and retired at age 80. He arrived in Sherman City in 1908, and retired in 1950.

He lived for a while in Mt. Pleasant, with frequent trips to Canada, and some to Florida, and then, some years ago he announced he was going to live at Villa Maria, a Catholic residence somewhat like the Masonic Home.
