SCHOOL ELECTION WILL INVOLVE MILLAGE FOR OLYMPIC SWIMMING POOL

Annual election date for the Chippewa Hills School District is set for June 8, and it will involve a vote for extra millage for the purpose of building an "Olympic sized" swimming pool into the new school building now in the process of being built.

With the district already heavily taxed on bonds to build the new school, we seriously question the need for an indoor swimming pool for our kids.

The Chippewa Hills Schools area is pock-marked with lakes and streams where our kids swim come every spring and summer. Does their high school education demand winter swimming as well?

We are willing to spend millions for real education for our young; this is evidenced by the vote for two and a half million for the new high school building, which will cost twice that amount with its carrying interest charges.

But does their education necessitate an Olympic-sized indoor swimming pool as well as the modern new building?

We see by the school's shopper's guide (a private business enterprise carried on in St. Louis), that the architects hired by the Board of Education for the new school building will put forth another beautiful brochure with which to lure fond parents into

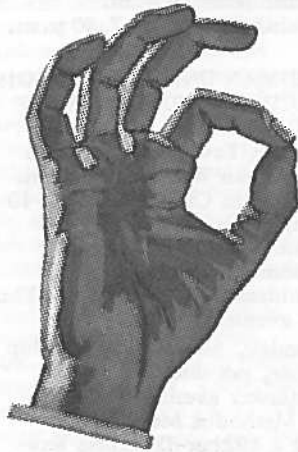
