MEMORIAL DAY PARADE IN PLANNING STAGE HERE

Plans for a bigger and better Memorial Day parade in Weidman are going along smoothly, according to the two originators, Marilyn Losey and Lucille Smith, and WBA president Mick Schmalbach.

This year's parade will be better than last year's, by the look of present plans; and last year's parade was a gratifying event.

This Memorial Day parade will begin at the Methodist Church parking lot at 2 o'clock p.m. Saturday, May 30; it will then go through the business section of Weidman to the Postoffice corner, and thence to Mitchell Memorial Park, where appropriate ceremonies will take place.

The program as planned calls for a post ceremony (placing a wreath for our soldier dead and prayers by two ministers and a short speech by one).

This will be followed by a flagraising ceremony, a firing squad from the Barryton Post of the American Legion will perform, the National Anthem will be played, and then Taps will end the program.

Sequence plans for the parade are as follows:

The Honor Guard, veterans of all wars, school Band, Boy Scouts Brownies, the Little and Peewee League boys, youngsters on bikes and other vehicles, the school Band, and a segment of horses and buggies.

This year's parade is being planned carefully and enthusiastically, and promises to be one of our best.

There will be no march to the cemetery. The program will begin and end at Mitchell Memorial Park.

This situation will prevail in all towns within the Chippewa Hills School District: Weidman, Barryton, Remus, and Mecosta. All towns will have a short march to some designated spot and forego any marches to any cemeter-

This is for the sake of the school bands, as the miles of marching to service all four towns would be too much for the young musicians, many of

whom carry heavy instruments.
All veterans of all wars are urgently invited to don uniforms and march in the Weidman parade. All kids are likewise urged to trim up their bikes and wagons with bunting and join the parade.
