#### LIBRARY OPENING DRAWS TWO HUNDRED VISITORS

The Gladys McArthur Memorial Library opened officially last weekend, with Open House Friday and Saturday that drew at least 200 visitors.

After a year of grubby work by volunteers, suddenly there was the Library--beautiful and orderly and with real books on real shelves. The public obviously was delighted.

Seventy-five visitors registered Friday, with 100 signing the guest book Saturday. Both days there were times when so many people were in the Library that it was impossible to determine if all had signed the guest book. It was known that many of them did not sign, due to their pleasure in the Library and the busy Library attendants' failure to request their names in the book.

Forty-one book checkouts were made Friday, with 36 requests for Library cards also on Friday. Figures were not available on Saturday's signups as we went to press. Over half of the visitors checked out books, however.

The bake sale and bazaar did wonderfully well, netting over a hundred dollars for the Library fund. A check was received Saturday from Coldwater Township in the amount of \$100.


All in all, it was a grand opening; and Weidman now officially has its own Library; a branch of the Mt. Pleasant Public Library, but Weidman's own.

LAKE PLATTING HELD UP BY INDECISION OF COMMITTEE OF PUBLIC WORKS DEPT.

In the opinion of local developers, most lake platting in the state of Michigan will be held up until a clear interpretation of orders by the Water Resources Commission is given county agencies. The feeling was expressed after a fruitless meeting Monday night between developers and a committee of the Department of Public Works, in Mt. Pleasant.

The Water Resources Commission has the power to demand a county-wide system of sewage disposal, but members of the committee meeting in Mt. Pleasant declined to lay out specific orders or plans for such a system.

Attending the meeting from this area were representatives from Lake Isabella, Lake Weidman and Lake of the Hills. No distinct understanding of the potentials of the WRC's powers was arrived at, except that the agency does have the power to order all lake plats to include sewage disposal facilities.

Until the Water Resources Commission in Lansing comes with a criteria for sewage planning in making plats, developers are helpless to proceed, it was stated here Tuesday.

Lake of the Hills has one plat before state officials for approval. Lake Isabella has four new plats waiting approval.
