IVAN ALLEN LOSES BY TWO

VOTES IN SCHOOL RECOUNT In a recount of ballots cast in the recent Chippewa Hills School election, Ivan Allen of Weidman

lost out to Harry Gardner of Barryton by two votes.

All precincts committed errors in the ballot counting except Mecosta, it was stated here Mon-

day.

The recount was taken Monday beginning at 10 a.m. in the court house at Big Rapids.

Monday's tally went as follows:

In the Weidman precinct, Ivan Allen had 223 votes to Gardner's 122. In Remus, Allen had 154 votes to Gardner's 182. In Mecosta, Allen had 144 votes to Gardner's 156. In Barryton, Allen had 102 votes to Gardner's

165.
The total in the recount: Gard-

ner 625, Allen 623.
In the Weidman precint Allen gained one vote in the recount.
In Remus Gardner lost four votes.
In Barryton both gained one vote.
Mecosta remained unchanged in the recount.

Editor's Column

WE TURN OUR COLUMN OVER TO OUR BROTHER IN TARRYTOWN THIS WEEK

This week we're turning over our Editor's Column to our brother, Charles H. Roe, of Tarry-town, New York, and giving you a letter from him which was printed in the local Tarrytown daily paper. Here 'tis.
The Daily News:
Your top-of-column editorial

in Saturday's edition entitled, "Perilous Bay State Challenge," and the syndicated article in Friday's edition by John P. Roche headed "Shenanigans in the Great Court," both castigated the action taken by the Massachusetts legislature and governor in enacting a law exempting men of that state from service in "armed hostilities" which are not authorized by a declaration of war by Congress. Your editorial writer and Mr. Roche both miss the point. I wonder if it was done purposely.

The fact is that Congress is no longer free to declare war as provided in the Constitution, that function having been treasonably given over to the United

Nations.

For 20 years we have been continuously engaged in war, first in Korea where we still have 55,000 men, and then also in Vietnam, drafting our men and pouring out billions, tying the hands of our commanders and our men so they cannot possibly win, abandoning those taken as prisoners of war by an uncivilized enemy, charging our own men with murder if they happen to hit the wrong target, all clearly showing that we are not really fighting a war on behalf of the United States.

Here is the actual wording of the United Nations Charter which replaces our Constitution, agreed to and ever since observed literally by those in pow-

er in Washington:

"Members confer on the Security Council primary responsibility for the maintenance of international peace and security, and agree that in carrying out its duties under this responsibility the Security Council acts on their behalf... Members agree to accept and carry out the decisions of the Security

Council..."
So the Massachusetts Legislature and governor are saying that they do not recognize the authority of the United Nations to order young men into war without the stipulated constitutional ac-

tion by Congress.

You have chosen to denounce this as "ominous, confused, discriminatory, deplorable, politi-cal, emotional." Roche frankly starts out with the statement that he favors abolition of the States and brushes aside the legislative action in Massachusetts as "interposition" which, he says, no legal scholar takes seri-

Then he proceeds to lampoon the Massachusetts legislators as cheap politicians, which they may be. But somebody up there must have heard about the United Nations which Roche pretends he has not and The Daily News just ignores it.

The American people are worried. They know many things are wrong, but they are not informed by those whose duty it is to tell them. Most congressmen are scared stiff lest the people find out what they have done.

The legislators of Massachusetts and the governor have a lot more guts, whatever their motives, than most of our officials

in Washington.

Slowly, gradually, the truth is being spread and realized. There has been treason in high places. If any considerable number of the people ever come to know just what has been going on, there could be frightful results.

Massachusetts may be taking the step which will precipitate the crisis.

FIRE DEPARTMENT SAVES BARN ON ERNEST RHODE FARM SATURDAY

The Nottawa and Sherman Township Volunteer Fire Department was called to the Ernest Rhode farm in Gilmore Saturday, and saved a barn in which a fire had been discovered. The saving of a barn by any fire department is very unusual, as hay is usually a factor in a barn fire.
