STORMS SWEEP OVER

THIS AREA MONDAY NIGHT A series of severe thunder show ers swept over this area Monday evening and night, knocking out telephone lines in the Horr area and flooding roads and areas as far southwest as Remus, where main roads down town were reported Tuesday morning as impassible.

A barn on Battle Road, northwest of the Dillenbeck place, owned by Donald J. Gadille of Trenton, was hit by a freak bolt of lightning which splintered heavy timbers and scattered the boards in all directions, according to reports.

The barn burned, and the Not-tawa and Sherman Volunteer Fire Department answered a call to the place. Damage was estimated at around \$2,000.

A washout on the road just north of the Clair Floria place over the line in Mecosta County caused an auto accident, but apparently there were no injuries. Earl Oplinger reported a reading of five inches in his rain gauge Tuesday morning. Ervin Dutcher had a 3.8-inch reading on his rain gauge.

Clayton Dutcher had difficulty getting home from work Monday evening, with road washouts hampering auto travel. His car was "drowned out" three times, he reported, south of the Woodin corner in southwest Sherman. Many telephones were knocked

Further thunder storms were predicted for Tuesday night and Wednesday.

All in the three-county storm area agreed it was the worst series of thunder storms in their experience. Storm warning were broadcast over Radio Station WCEN Tuesday evening and night.



PERMITS NEEDED FOR

BUILDING OR MOVING HOMES In the townships of Sherman, Coldwater and Broomfield, on this side of the county, a build-ing permit must be obtained from the township ordinance enforcer before starting to put up a home. Elsewhere, or in most townships, ual to live his life without federal building permits must be obtained from the Isabella County enforcer, Aaron Prout, of Rosebush.

The township ordinances are more lenient and also more economical to the builder or home mover than the county ordinance The county zoning ordinance demands at least an acre of land with 165 feet of frontage; a permit for septic system must be

obtained from the County Health Department (this is also necessary according to township ordinance);

When applying for a building or mobile home moving, take along a septic-tank permit, a legal description of the property, a sketch showing location of any present buildings on the property; a driveway permit from the County Road Commission (except on lake lots, where driveways are taken into consideration on lot layout); and have the proposed building staked out for a site inspection.

Outside alterations or additions to existing buildings must be cleared by a permit.

Any new structure planned for 100 or more square feet must

have a permit. There are regulations on how close to highways and roads and corners such buildings may be placed.

In other words, if you're planning building anything, see you local authority first. He will show you the Township Ordinance and its regulations; or in townships not having ordinan-ces, you must go to Aaron Prout of Rosebush for interpretation of county ordinance regulations. ---0---
